Fairview First Product Of Big Top Construction

When it welcomes its first students into its spacious corridors on September 7, Fairview Elementary School will have the distinction of being the first school in the area constructed under the big top. The 17½ elementary school in the district is located at 32300 Rock Ridge Road. Designed to accommodate 480 students from kindergarten through sixth grade, the school will open its doors to approximately 350 who live in its vicinity. General contractor Carl W. Luoma thinks he may be the first builder to utilize the circular tent in school construction. He devised it originally to solve the problem of winter layoffs and delays due to bad weather. It wasn't easy to locate a company which could provide the right amount of canvas, but Luoma finally did. Cobb Canvas Co., Detroit went to work with him on the experiment.
