Federal Funds Pay For Study Of School Needs

A \$19,260 federal grant to finance a study of the educational media needs of area schools has been approved, Dr. William J. Emerson, superintendent of Oakland Schools, was informed June 14.

The project, which will begin in September, will involve representatives from each school district in Oakland County, resource people from the communities as well as representatives from area libraries and museums.

Working with two full time professional librarians or audio-visual specialists yet to be named, the committee will determine ways the cultural resources of the area can be incorporated into school programs. They will also study the possibility of establishing centralized film, sound and video tape libraries, mobile museums and planetariums. Five months have been allocated for the study.

Kenbrook School Staff Honors Dr. Jack Cleveland

Dr. Jack Cleveland, principal at Kenbrook School, was honored by his staff last week at a tea. Dr. Cleveland, who completed his doctoral studies at Wayne State University this spring, received his degree at Cobo Hall June 9. Kenbrook staff members presented the educator with a plaque bearing his new title.

Cleveland spent some eight years of part-time study and effort on the degree. His research project investigated the extent to which the oral language of kindergarten children can be affected before they learn to read through direct training efforts.

With THE COOPERATION of the Farmington Board of Education and using the services of a project teacher for which he paid, Cleveland studied the effects of direct verbal training on some forty children—two groups at Bond School and two Kenbrook groups. Parental permission was required for each child's participation.

Results of his study indicated that additional verbal training can improve a child's learning and reading progress. The project took 16 weeks.

Cleveland has been principal at Kenbrook for the past two years. Previously he was principal of Alameda School and at the start of his doctoral studies he was a fifth grade teacher in Royal Oak.

"My interest is chiefly in elementary school," said Cleveland. "This kind of language skills program is helpful to professionals at the elementary teaching level. We know that poor oral language skill and poor reading go together."

Dr. Cleveland is also involved in the educational aspects of family counseling with the Christian Counseling Center in Royal Oak.

Oakland College To Train Technicians

Oakland Community College has been awarded \$96,430 to train cooks, draftsmen and service station mechanics under the provisions of the Manpower Development and Training Act (MDTA). James H. Dotseth, OCC director of technical and vocational programs, announced June 13.

Twenty trainees will begin a 18-week service station mechanic course on July 5; 20 trainees will begin a 36-week drafting course on July 11, and 20 trainees will begin a 36-week cooking and baking course on August 8.

Including subsistence allowances for the trainees, the program has been funded for \$183,224. All trainees are screened by the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

The programs will be taught at the OCC Highland Lakes Campus.

Edison Company States Position

On Area Strike

At midnight Wednesday, June 15, Local 223 of the Utility Workers Union of America (AFL-CIO), representing about 3000 Detroit Edison operating employees, went on strike against the Company. The Federal and Michigan State mediation services worked through the day endeavoring to bring about an avoidance of the strike. Company officials stated that the Company cooperated fully with the mediators and is most appreciative of their efforts. They said the Company was willing to continue the services of members of Local 223 either on an extension of the contract beyond midnight or an extension beyond the strike deadline without a contract in order to give the mediators more time to work out a solution, but this was refused by the Union.

A Company spokesman said, "The Company has made a fair and generous offer in order to reach a settlement. By all standards of comparison it is a just offer although the Company's position may be portrayed otherwise by Local 223. The facts are clear and well known to the mediators who have been most constructive in their endeavors. The Company and its supervisory personnel and others will continue the high standard of service to the best of our ability."

Mrs. Thomas Duke Named '66 Torch Drive Chairman

Mrs. Thomas Duke, of Farmington, has been named Region 44 Chairman for the 1966 Torch Drive by Mrs. William L. McCracken, Oakland County Residential Chairman.

Mrs. McCracken said, "We are pleased that a woman of Mrs. Duke's top leadership ability has accepted the post of Region 44 Chairman. Her previous work as block worker and district chairman brings valuable insight and organizational facility to her new post."

Mrs. Duke will be in charge of the training and supervision of soliciting Torch Drive contributors from residents in Farmington, Wood Creek Farms, Commerce, Lyon, South Lyon, Wolverine Lake, Walled Lake, Wixom, and Novi.

She succeeds Mrs. Donald E. Schlack, of Farmington, in this post.

THIS YEAR'S DRIVE will be held from Oct. 18 through Nov. 10 and will seek operating funds for more than 200 health and social agencies.

The goal for this year has not yet been announced. Last year a record \$25,900,000 was raised during the "Give Once for All" campaign in the tri-county area.

In 1964, direct aid was brought to 1,200,000 people in 113 communities of Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties through Torch Drive services. Included are 32 child care agencies which provide shelter, training and care for hundreds of homeless children; 25 health research centers fighting cancer, heart disease and other incurable diseases.

Also 54 health and medical agencies treating the sick and the handicapped; 32 services for the aging; 68 youth character-building agencies and 44 services for troubled families.
