L.L. Officers Speechless After 1st Perfect Game

The No. 2 diamond at Bond Elementary School was the scene last Saturday, July 9, of the first perfect game to be pitched in Little League history.

The Orioles, top team in the American League Majors of the North Farmington-West Bloomfield Little League set this record when they played Richard Frankel's Red Sox last Saturday.

Norm Colbert of Spring Ridge (Franklin Valley) is the manager of the Orioles team.

The winning pitcher was Gary Mooney, 13 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. James Mooney of Cambourne Place, Brar-cliff.

Mooney pitched the first five innings of the game, striking out 11 of the 15 men he faced.

Mooney had to go out of the game at the end of the fifth because of a League ruling which allows a pitcher in the Major Leagues to pitch only six innings per week. Gary had pitched one inning last Thursday night against the Tigers in a game which had gone into overtime.

Jeff Colbert came on in the sixth inning of Saturday's game and struck out two of the three men he faced. Ted Kozani, of Brar-cliff Knoll, Brar-cliff, went the distance behind the plate. Ted, Sr., was the big hitting star of the Philadelphia Phillies 10 years ago.

The Orioles are a "bustling team," in Manager Colbert's words.

Colbert stresses team spirit to his players, always emphasizing that they "play as a unit."

No one questions that his theory is a successful one. Colbert has managed for six years in the NF-WB Little League. Last year, his team was first in the league.

Colbert has many of the same players back this year, and his Orioles are two full games ahead in the league.

More important, the value of team play played an important role in setting the perfect game record.

Two good defensive infield plays turned base hits into outs. One was a back-up play of pitcher Mooney by Brad Kline. The other was a line-drive smash to first fielded perfectly by Colbert who was playing first base at the time.

Mooney, Kozani and Kline have already been selected for the All Star Team which goes into action next week in the district finals hosted for the first time by the NF-WB Little League.

Manager Colbert kept shaking his head in amazement at what his boys had done, and mumbling, "Eighteen men up; and eighteen men down."

Commissioner Bob Gratton, when informed of the record which had been set in his league, said, "When you play a Little League game when a one game to first in the league, and his voice trailed off at the other end of the telephone wire.

- ☐ Discontinue milk and newspapers. Notify dairy and publication office—do not leave notes.
- ☐ Arrange with neighbor or relative to remove mail, handbills, throwaways, etc.
- ☐ Notify your Police Department when you are leaving and when you will return.
- ☐ Leave house key with neighbor for periodic internal checks and care of plants.
- ☐ Advise police who has key and who else has authorized access to your home.
- ☐ In addition, arrange with one or two neighbors to watch your home. Ask them to report any suspicious activities to the police.
- ☐ Protect your travel funds against loss or theft—use Travelers Checks. Available at any National Bank of Detroit office.
- ☐ Be sure all range burners and oven are "OFF."
- ☐ Disconnect all radios, television, toasters, electric clocks and other appliances.
- ☐ Turn water heater "OFF."
- ☐ Be sure your oil or gas furnace is turned "OFF."
