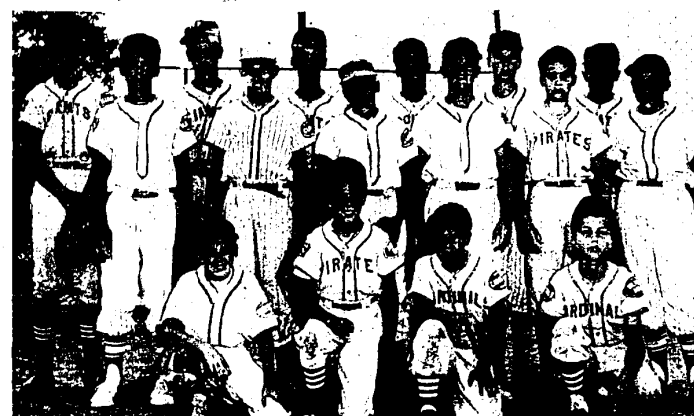

Jr. Legion Final Week Shows F'ton Slim Lead

Farmington Junior American Legion team leads the 18th District by a slim one-game margin going into their final week of play. During the week of play, Farmington lost their first game in their last 10 outings but rebounded with a double header victory over Walled Lake.

Farmington will encounter Bertley at home July 22, will visit Milford on July 23 for the final road game of the season and will close out the regular season July 24 with a double header at home against Milford which will be played at Our Lady of Sorrows diamond at 2 p.m.

The big Legion game will be played at Southfield on Wednesday July 20 and the second place team, Waterford, will encounter third place Southfield. The standings going into the final week of the season for the top 3 teams are as follows:

On Wednesday, July 13 Farmington defeated Troy 8-2 behind Jerry Turner's 3 hit pitching for his 4th consecutive win. Farmington struck early in the 1st inning on a single by Myles Kearney, a fielder's choice to Carl Misch and Tom Webster's single scoring Kearney. They increased it 2-0 in the 2nd inning on a single by Mike Perry, a walk to Jerry Turner, Chris Norton doubled, scoring Perry. Farmington made it 6-0 in the 3rd inning on Wayne Johnston's bases loaded triple.	
Troy scored a lone run in the 4th inning when Jerry Turner gave up 2 of the 4 hits. Farmington capped its scoring in the 5th inning when Tom Webster led off with a walk and Chuck Viane unloaded his 3rd home run of the season. Turner struck out 10 Troy batters while only walking 2.	
Friday, July 15 Farmington dropped its 1st game in the last 10 outings to Southfield 4-1. Farmington picked up one run on 2 hits, a double by Chris	

Norton and a single by Myles Kearney. Southfield scored 4 runs on 2 hits with neither hit figuring in the scoring. All of Southfield's runs were unearned due to 27 errors committed by the Farmington infield. Manager Wally Christensen announced that it was the worst game his players have played all season.

Sunday July 17 they bounced back with a double header victory over Walled Lake by the scores of 12-3 and 6-4. While Chuck Viane picked up his 7th win in the first game and Jerry Turner won his 5th in a row in the 2nd game, it was great relief pitching in both games by Rick Krumm who pitched 3/3 innings of relief striking out 7, walking one and giving up 2 scratch singles.

The first game was highlighted by Wayne Johnston's 2-run homer collecting a single and a double. Mike Searley went 4 for 4 while Chuck Viane had a triple and a single with Myles Kearney and Jerry Tinkie picking up a pair of singles each. Walled Lake jumped off to a 3-0 lead in the second game but Farmington tied it up in the 3rd inning with one hit. Chris Norton singled after 2 were out. Carl Misch singled

and there was a back to back triple by Chuck Viane and Joe Himmelspach. Farmington took the lead in the 4th on a single by Jerry Tinkie, a passed ball, and Jerry Turner's 2 base hit. Farmington made it 6-3 in the 5th inning on a walk to Misch, and Joe Himmelspach's double scoring on Wayne Johnston's infield grounder. In the top of the 6th with one out a man on second and a run across, Rick Krumm came in to strike out the side and finished the game retiring the side in the 7th inning. In the 6th inning, Wayne Johnston and Joe Himmelspach had to leave the ballgame when they were involved in a collision in right field with both ball players having the wind knocked out of them and sustaining minor injuries.
