By attending you can help a new leader feel a little easier as she starts working with the girls. 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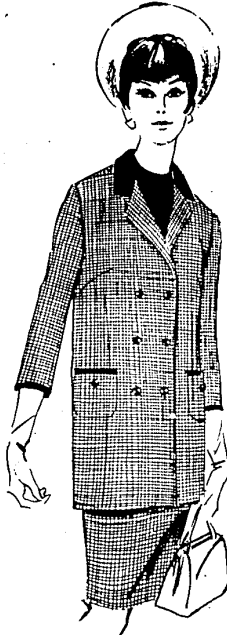
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
