Physical Exams Slated For All School Athletes

Physical examinations for all boys who plan to participate in any athletics during the coming school year have been scheduled to take place at two high schools two weeks from now. The schedule is as follows:

Footballers Need Physical Exams

Boys interested in Farmington Junior Football must be signed up by Saturday, August 20, reminds C. E. Smith, public relations officer.

Practice will begin on August 21, but before boys are allowed to engage in sports which involve body contact, they must have a doctor's certificate. Physical examinations will be available at Farmington Junior High School on Thursday, August 22 at 11 a.m. for South Farmington Junior Footballers.

North Farmington residents will be examined Friday, August 26 at North Farmington High School.

There will be a charge of \$1.00 per boy for these physicals, and each boy must have the examination form provided by the Junior Football Association as these cards must be signed in duplicate by the examining doctor.

The Dad's Club which has been meeting at the Blue Lantern will continue to be the only ones until notified regarding a new meeting place.

Thursday, August 25 and Friday, August 26, high school athletes are to be at their respective high schools at 9 a.m., and junior high school athletes are to be at the high school in their area at 10 a.m. Examinations for Little League football players will be given at 11 a.m.

Jack Cotton, Director of Physical Education, Farmington Public Schools, emphasized that all boys who wish to participate in any athletics must take the physical examinations. Sports Participation Medical Record forms were provided earlier, and examinations will be given unless the forms have been filled out and signed by the boys' parents and are presented at examination time, Cotton said.

Arrangements for examination forms for Little League players should be made through the Little League organization.

Those who have moved into the district recently and do not have forms, and those who have misplaced them, may pick them up at the school they will be attending. The forms should be picked up early so that they can be filled out and signed before the examination dates.

Cotton said that the examinations are being given in cooperation with local medical doctors at a nominal cost of \$1 per boy and the dates mentioned are the only ones on which these examinations will be given.

Dear Mrs. Lutz: It is a pleasure to inform you that your son, Private Stephen J. Lutz Jr., 2281704, U. S. Marine Corps was selected as honor man of his platoon and was graduated from recruit training on 1 August 1966. The Commanding Officer of the Recruit Training Regiment, Colonel Wm. L. Dick, U. S. Marine Corps has issued a certificate to Stephen in recognition of his achievement.

As the platoon honor man he also was selected to receive the dress blue uniform awarded by Leatherneck Magazine to the outstanding recruit in each platoon.

In order that you may have a full understanding of your son's accomplishment, it should be noted that the platoon of which your son was a member numbers 78 men. Your son was closely judged in competition with all other men in his platoon on basic military subjects, as well as on his conduct, attitude and military bearing. Area Tourists Visit Oak Ridge

Barbara and Patricia Doyle, 33336 Schulte Ave., recently visited the American Museum of Atomic Energy, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, which features demonstrations and displays on peaceful uses of the atom.

The Museum, operated for the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission by Oak Ridge Associated Universities, is the only institution devoted exclusively to nuclear science. Especially trained lecture-demonstrators show how the power of the atom is utilized in medicine, industry and agriculture.

A lecture in the Museum's "Medical Room" illustrates how radioisotopes of "tracer atoms" are used in diagnosis and treatment of thyroid disturbances and cancer. Mechanical hands of the type used in Oak Ridge laboratories and operated by the tour guide show visitors how radioactive materials may be handled safely.

A huge reactor model is used in still another area to describe the workings and purposes of the various types of nuclear reactors.

Dozens of other exhibits and electronic devices, many operated by the spectator, are available to Museum visitors. They include a cutaway model of the nuclear cargo ship "Savannah," a cloud chamber illustrating the use in physics research of vapor trails such as those left by jet planes, a hall of fame for scientists, visitor operated tests of materials for radioactivity, the workings of a uranium mine, and devices equipped with ear phones and tape recordings describing chain reaction.

Paul Houghton of Wilmarth St. returned home Friday from Henry Ford Hospital after undergoing major surgery. He will be at home for a period of convalescence.

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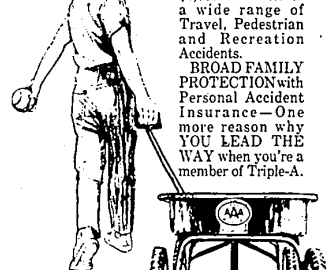
