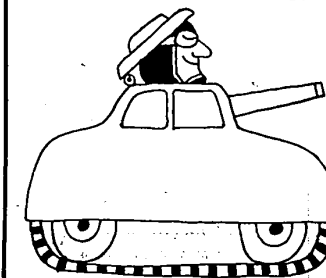

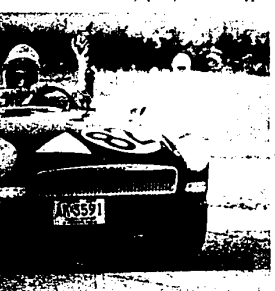

THIS HAPPY GROUP of smiling Farmingtoners really have "winning" smiles. Larry M. Cline is sharing his victory lap at

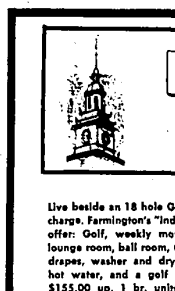
Waterford Hills with his wife Linda and his father Larry A., all of 32545 Shadyridge.
