

# Township Receives Grant To Begin Land Use Study

Six Michigan communities, Farmington Township among them, have been given grants to begin a study of the Federal Government to conduct comprehensive studies of land use. The first installment was in the amount of \$14,328.

Grants were based on the 1960 population figures which show Farmington Township with an official population of 26,892 at that time.

Elated over the grant Curt Hall, Township Supervisor, let it be known that the request for the grant was made last fall and now that the grant has been made no time will be lost in starting the study.

"We have a comprehensive plan, worked out by the Planning Commission," he stated, "but until the construction of the present freeways and others still to be built there is a

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go up at the point township officials carry out plans to increase assessments by more than 100 per cent as required by the state's new Constitution. An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 29 of the Township of Farmington entitled:

"An Ordinance enacted under Act 184, Public Acts of 1943, as amended, governing the unincorporated portions of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, to regulate and restrict the location and use of buildings, structures and land for trade, industry, residence and for public and semi-public or other specified uses; and to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings and other structures; to regulate and to determine the size of yards, courts and open spaces; to regulate and limit the density of population; and for said purposes to divide the township into districts and establishing the boundaries thereof; providing for changes in the regulations, restrictions and boundaries of said districts; and to provide for the enforcement of said regulations; establishing a Board of Appeals; and imposing penalties for the violation of this Ordinance."

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan:

SECTION ONE. That Sections 700, 800, 900 and 1103 of said Ordinance No. 29, of the Township of Farmington, as amended, are hereby amended in the following particulars:

SECTION 700 - paragraph 6, add a subparagraph e. as follows:

e. No sign attached to a building or free standing shall exceed the maximum height allowed for buildings in B-1 Districts.

SECTION 800 - paragraph 4, add a subsection e. as follows:

e. No sign attached to a building or free standing shall exceed the maximum height allowed for buildings in B-2 Districts.

SECTION 900 - paragraph 10, add a subsection d. as follows:

d. No sign attached to a building or free standing shall exceed the maximum height allowed for buildings in B-3 Districts.

SECTION 1103 - paragraph 1, add as follows:

No sign attached to a building or free standing shall exceed the maximum height allowed for buildings in B-1 Districts.

SECTION TWO. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

SECTION THREE. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect upon publication of the Ordinance in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan.

SECTION FOUR. This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, at a meeting thereof duly called and held on the 14th day of September, 1966, and to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.

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moting this community project. At no time have they put any pressure on the schools, and I must recommend continuation of the program."

Over Neal's dissenting vote, the Board approved the continued co-sponsorship and the additional cost of the tickets, \$1 to go to each of the sponsors.

Expenditures for the month in the amount of \$2,864.63 were approved with Supt. Harrison pointing out that one and a half million of this amount was for re-investment of funds.

Assistant Superintendent Marius VanAmeyde told the Board that all teaching stations in the district have been filled. Twenty-two of the positions are presently filled on a substitute basis, and it is hoped that they will be permanently settled at an early date.

Approval was given to the purchase of one and a quarter acres near Fairview School for \$11,000. Part of the land will be used for a walking easement, and part of it may be resold.

Ford Motor Co. was the low bidder for a front loader needed by the district and their bid of \$452 was accepted. The Board authorized the sale of two buses which they felt had reached retirement age, one being a '55 model, one a '57.
