Understanding your HEALTH

"A rose by any other name would smell as sweet"—is a saying familiar to all of us. Now, while it's true, of course, that roses would smell just as sweet even if they were called "globs," let's say, if for one, wouldn't be quite so fond of them.

Names after all, do have character and even personality, and they also usually have some pretty specific meanings. All of which leads me to the subject of medical names and how much trouble they sometimes cause.

Medical terminology, unfortunately is based in large part on Greek and Latin derivations—as a result, it tends to become confusing and even sometimes completely misunderstood by many folks.

For example, many people seem to think that a doctor is one thing, and an osteopath another. Now, while there are differences, the fact is, that both are doctors or physicians who practice medicine. The most commonly accepted doctor is the one who has an M.D. degree from a medical school. But an osteopath is also a practicing doctor who happens to have a D.O. degree from an osteopathic college.

Another kind of doctor is the chiropractor who believes that disease is caused by abnormal functions of the nervous system. His treatment is limited to adjusting, by hand, misaligned or displaced vertebrae of the human spine and the procedures preparatory thereto. He is not permitted to perform surgery or to prescribe drugs or medicines to treat disease.

People sometimes confuse the chiropractor with the chiropodist and perhaps for this reason, among others, the chiropodists have changed their name and are now called podiatrists. These doctors limit their practice to a kind of medicine which has to do solely with the care of the human foot.

Unfortunately, it seems to me, podiatrists can become confused with pediatricians—but pediatricians, of course, are M.D.'s who have gone on to specialize in the care and treatment of children.

Finally, there's the very confusing matter of interns and internists. Both words sound much alike that many folks tend to think they're the same. Actually an intern is someone who has just graduated from a medical school and is serving a type of apprenticeship in a hospital, before he becomes licensed to practice medicine. The internist, on the other hand, is a doctor of medicine, who has been licensed and who has then gone back to school for several years of additional training and who is therefore a type of advanced physician specializing in medical as contrasted with surgical diseases and conditions.

Indeed, what's in a name?
