Nardin Park Methodist Church Plans Fall Lectures

During the month of October, the Nardin Park Methodist Church on West Eleventh Mile Road in Farmington will present a series of three lectures with outstanding speakers. Each of these programs will be preceded by a dinner at 7 p.m. served by the ladies of the church at a cost of \$1.50 per person. A question and answer period will follow each of the talks.

The first program is scheduled for Tuesday, October 11. The speaker will be Dr. LeRoy Augenstein, Head of the Department of Biophysics at Michigan State University. The topic will be "Religion and Science in Our Contemporary World." Dr. Augenstein has a nationwide reputation and is in great demand as a speaker on the various aspects of Science.

On Wednesday, October 19, General Lester Bork, President of the Economic Club of Detroit, will speak on "Religion and Current Events in Our Contemporary World." General Bork is a West Point graduate and served with great distinction in the Pacific during World War II. He was Chief Defense Counsel for the Japanese Military War Criminal Trials and was senior Army advisor to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek during the Communist attacks in 1958-60. It is a rare privilege to have General Bork as a guest speaker.

The third and last of the series will be given on Wednesday, October 26 with Dr. Louis W. Norris, President of Albion College, as the guest speaker.

His topic will be "Religion and the World Mission of Christianity." Dr. Norris has had a distinguished scholastic career since 1946 and has served in his present position at Albion since 1960. During this period, Albion has become one of the finest church-sponsored colleges in the entire country.

Bonds Approved For Sewer Work

Approval of \$180,000 in special assessment bonds for the Grand River Homes sewer project in Farmington Township has been announced by Michigan Attorney General Frank J. Kelley, chairman of the Municipal Finance Commission.

Kelley said, "The proceeds will be used to defray the cost of constructing sewers in Special Assessment District No. 29 of the Township.

"These bonds are payable primarily from a like amount of special assessments due in 15 annual installments, with the full faith and credit of the township pledged to meet principal and interest should the installments be slow in coming in."

Other members of the Municipal Finance Commission are Allison Green, State Treasurer; and Ira Polley, Superintendent of Public Instruction.
