Selected crewmen from the battery fired missiles at radio-controlled aerial targets during the exercise. SNAPs are designed to maintain the combat readiness of air defense units. Only 48 hours' notice is allowed before crews are alerted to the firing range.

A hawk section chief in the artillery's Battery D, 3rd Missile Battalion, stationed near Bad Kissingen, Sgt. Chase entered on active duty in December 1956 and arrived overseas on this tour of duty in August 1964.

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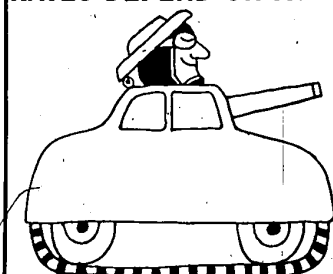
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J. Wagner Enters
