

Henkel Realty At Golden Year

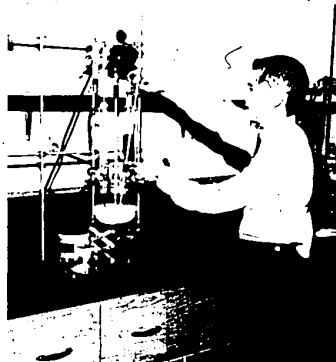

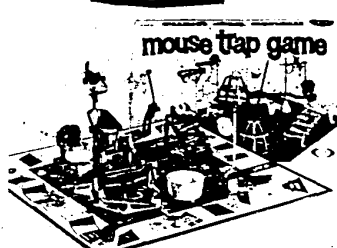
Mrs. Mack Eveleth, chairman of the Book Fair, said there would be a large selection of new children's books on hand and an extensive list for ordering.
