

Puppet Shows Scheduled At Institute Of Arts

A triple bill of three short, puppet shows—and an opportunity to "meet the stars" immediately after the performances—will open the Detroit Puppet Theatre season in The Detroit Institute of Arts on Saturday, October 15 at 10 a.m., 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. This appearance of the B. Gay puppets is the fourth return engagement at the museum for Ann Cohen and Bea Geier, who have been active puppets for 12 years.

Their program will be a varied one, beginning with "The Three Wishes," a Spanish folk tale with authentic music, a comic ballad, colorful costumes and a 19th century setting called "The Monkey and the Serpent" will be a presentation in ballet style, using rod and hand puppets. Rounding out the program will be "The Rabbit Who Wanted Red Wings" based on a folk tale of the American South.

The B. Gay puppets perform regularly at the Museum of Art. Individual tickets are 50¢, 35¢ each for groups of 10 or more, or to members of the museum's Founders Society.
