

# Puppet Shows Scheduled At Institute Of Arts

A triple bill of three short puppet shows—and an opportunity to "meet the stars" immediately after the performance—will open the Detroit Puppet Theatre season in The Detroit Institute of Arts auditorium on Saturday, Oct. 15 at 10 a.m., 1 p.m. and 3 p.m.

This appearance of the B. Gay puppets is the fourth return engagement at the museum for Ann Cohen and Ben Geller, who have been active puppeteers for 12 years.

Their program will be a varied one, beginning with "The Three Wishes," a Spanish folk tale with authentic costumes and lively dancing. An African folk allegory called "The Monkey and the Serpent" will be a presentation in ballet style, using rod and hand puppets. Rounding out the program will be "The Rabbit Who Wanted Red Wings" based on a folk tale of the American South.

The B. Gay puppets perform regularly at the Museum of

the City of New York, as well as throughout the public school systems of New York and New Jersey, and for many cultural enrichment programs.

The Detroit Puppet Theatre is sponsored by the Theatre Arts Dept. of the Detroit Institute of Arts and underwritten by a grant from the Detroit News.
