Christian Science Text For Sunday

"The response to our call for the Congress indicates that multitudes of Christians are conscience-stricken," Henry declares. "Too long we have allowed worthy secondary pursuits to preclude us from the threshold of a great new movement in the Church to Day of Prayer."

'Othello' Opening Night Triumph For Players

Stratford, Ontario can look to its laurels after the opening night performance of "Othello" at the Farmington Players' Barn. It was rich, full-bodied Shakespeare from curtain to curtain.

Joseph Papp who played the Moor also adapted the classic for the performers. His was a powerful interpretation of the brooding and darkly passionate hero which kept his audience completely mesmerized until the final tragic breath.

Agg was as cunning and diabolical a villain as ever muttered those crafty asides in which the role abounds. His facial expressions (and this is where the small playhouse makes a performance vastly more enjoyable; at some points, the audience seemed almost members of the cast) were superb. Richard George Pedicini could scarcely

have improved upon the part. He was a complete and masterly scoundrel.

As Desdemona, Janice Salisbury was faithful to the tradition of Shakespearean heroines, chaste, lovely, graceful and moving in an aura of all that is finest in femininity.

The patios she brought to her role moved her audience to deep involvement with her doomed plight.

Her Cassio, as played by Dorothy Papp, revealed the earlier, more realistic facets of the feminine mystique and was a proper foil for the emotional qualities of her mistress.

All of the supporting players deserve kudos for their work. The roster includes Al Pike as Rodrigo, Harry Clark as the Duke, Dennis Broadhead convincingly advanced in age as Iago, and John Wilson and Norel McNeely as senators and soldiers. Stu Orman as Montano, and Bob Thomas as Cassio.

Obviously, for all of this performing excellence much credit is due to director Nancy Harrower and her assistant Mary Ann Perry. Technical director was John Perry, and stage managers were John Wilson and Joanne Kämron.

Costumes were colorful and delightful without being in the least overdone. For this tasteless job, nods must be directed to Ruth Caswell, Hope Harlow and Delores Vanderberg.

Backs for set direction which was severely simple but totally in keeping with the mood of the play go to Don Briggs, Nora McNeely, and Ray Harrower.

Wrestless smiles are sent toward the rest of the assisting players: Norm Hosking for programs, Shirley Carlson for sound and Marilyn Pace for properties.

Additional presentations of the play may be seen Oct. 14 and 15.

Farmington High Schools Receive Films From NBD

A new series of athletic instructional films, endorsed by the U.S. Olympic Committee and the President's Council on Physical Fitness, is being distributed to high schools in the Detroit area, as a public service, by National Bank of Detroit.

The program got under way in the Farmington area when Harry L. Lapham, Assistant Vice President of the NBD-Farmington office made the presentation to the athletic directors and administrators of the Farmington school system. Participating in the presentation were Robert Kelly, Physical Education Director at Our Lady of Sorrows High School; and John K. Cotton, Director of Physical Education for the Farmington schools.

High schools participating in the NBD program will receive three new films each year.

Films are presently available on 17 different subjects. Filming techniques include the use of multiple-camera setups, slow motion, stop-action, and animation. Team sports are taught through a combination of demonstration and game action shots, attention to individual athletes in specific positions and animation. College teams and coaches are utilized. In individual events, such as swimming, track and field techniques are demonstrated by star athletes, most of whom are Olympic champions or world record holders.
