Statement Concerns Candidates

The Board of County Road Commissioners of Oakland County has issued this statement:

Each election year, our office is besieged with complaints regarding the posting of political signs within the right of way of highways in Oakland County.

The laws of our State prohibit the affixing of signs to trees upon any public highway and further prohibits the placing of unauthorized signs within county rights of way. The laws provide for both civil and criminal liability for violation.

Aside from the unsightly conditions which these signs cause, and the ill feeling which is sometimes generated among candidates for office; there is an expenditure of Road Commission funds in removing illegal signs, which we feel could be better used for the maintenance and construction of highways.

We do not believe it to be the desire of any candidate for office to knowingly violate the laws of our State. Therefore, we ask your cooperation in making this information known to all candidates for public office in an effort to see that our highways are kept free from all political advertisements during the election campaign.
