## Clarenceville Completes Study On Report Cards

Conferences for teachers and parents will be taking place in the Clarenceville schools next week. It is urged that parents make every effort to attend. The schedule has been arranged so that the Boland Elementary will hold conferences on October 24, Edgewood on the 25th, Grandview on the 26th and Westbrook on the 27th.

A committee consisting of members of the elementary faculty and parents has submitted a two year study concerned with how to report students' intellectual and social growth to the parents. Their study included examining and studying report forms used in other Michigan schools used in this area, reading literature and research articles related to this topic, submitting questionnaires to parents and faculty, and drafting check list report forms which were used on an experimental basis for teacher-parent conferences on October 18. After completion of this study, the following criteria were used in formulating an instrument for reporting pupil growth.

Does it indicate a child's level of progress in terms of his own capacities and abilities?

Does it consider the child as an individual, as well as a member of a social group?

Does it emphasize stimulating and guiding the child, rather than judging him?

Is it suitable to the age level for which it is made?

Does it tell the parents completely and completely how the child's intellectual, social, physical, and emotional development is progressing?

Does it show each child's present level of growth and suggest possibility for future growth in all areas?

In summary, does the report help a child's parents, and his teachers learn more about what is capable of, what is not, what is his potential, and what is being done to foster his learning?

The new report form which was recommended to the Board of Education and approved by the members consists of the following:

1. Standardized areas of scholastic achievement as well as social adjustment and growth. The checks will be placed in the three categories Outstanding, Satisfactory, and Needs to Improve. It is noted that the level of progress indicated is related to the teacher's estimate of the relationship to the teacher's estimate of the student's ability.

The rating of Outstanding describes exceptional achievement and indicates that in the best judgment of the teacher, the child has clearly evidenced maximum achievement in relation to his ability.

The rating of Satisfactory indicates that the student's achievement is considered to be reasonably consistent with the teacher's estimate of his ability.

The rating of Needs to Improve indicates that in the best judgment of the teacher, the child is capable of doing better work.

The form will also be used for scheduled parent teacher conferences, as well as regular report card marking periods. Space is provided for written explanation and elaboration where needed.

This new report form will be used on a trial basis for one year. At the end of that time it will be evaluated and recommended changes for improvement will be considered.


