Each month Safety Bulletins will be printed which will include falls, burns, baby sitting, poison prevention, safe driving and bicycling, home mechanical equipment, vacationing, and winter and summer recreation.

Kitten Distemper Serious Warns County Vet. Assoc.

Was your family blessed with a new arrival recently? Possibly a black, fuzzy, friendly little kitten? If so, you will want to make sure that your pet receives the best in necessary health protection, the Oakland County Veterinary Medical Association suggests.

According to an Association spokesman, your kitten is susceptible to a number of diseases, many of which can be fatal. Cats may have internal parasites, skin disorders, fleas, and ear infections. They appear to be much more susceptible to anemia than any other domestic animal.

One of the most serious diseases which threatens your kitten is cat distemper, also known as cat plague, agranulocytosis, panleukopenia, and infectious enteritis. Distemper mostly attacks kittens; and as a result, the OCVMA recommends kittens should be vaccinated against the disease as soon after weaning as possible.

What is Cat Distemper? Cat distemper is a very contagious virus disease which may bring death to as many as 90 percent of the cats it infects. The disease occurs at various times of the year in epidemic force, usually in areas where there is a large kitten population.

What Are the Symptoms? Cats that contract distemper lose pep, cease to play, and refuse eat or drink. It is not unusual for a cat to appear completely recovered from the disease after one or two days. Usually, however, the symptoms return within 24 to 48 hours and the cat becomes seriously sick.

During this stage of the illness, a cat acts dazed and becomes unsteady. It may lie on its back, with its head on its front paws, or hover over a saucer of milk although it is unable to drink. Unless treatment is begun immediately, a kitten usually dies within a week after becoming sick, the OCVMA warns.

Windows To Sprout Helping Hand Signs

Know Your Michigan Law

(This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.)

On January 1, 1966 the basis for determination of liability for the care and maintenance of retarded persons in state institutions was changed by a new law. The change involved a question of which relatives must pay the cost.

Previously, liability was placed on the husband, wife, father and mother. Financially responsible relatives also included grandparents. Liability ceases when the retarded person is 21 years of age or when he has been a patient in a public institution for a period of 15 years, which ever occurs first. Hereafter, legally liable relatives were held financially responsible during the whole period of commitment.

Before the new law, the amount of liability was fixed by the probate court based generally on the probate court's determination of the relative's ability to pay for the support and maintenance of the patient. Now, liability is determined in accordance with a list of relatives and their relative income for federal income tax purposes in accordance with the following table:
