Bloomberg Appointed

The Farmington Youth Guidance Committee held its second meeting of the 1966-67 year on Tuesday, October 11, at 3342 Grand River. Chairman Jim Alstrom announced that Dr. Sanford Bloomberg would assume the duties of chairman of the newly expanded Case Study Committee.

Dr. Bloomberg, who resides at 2920 Piper Lane, is a psychiatrist and a Birmingham School System.

Clayton Weeks, who ably chaired the Committee for the last several years, will continue to serve on the Committee.

The Case Study Committee will serve as the professional consulting service to Richard LaForge, Oakland County Social Worker who spends two days a week in Farmington, and will also arrange for local volunteer professional psychological help for clients.

Clients, up to the age of 17, are referred by the city and township police, school system, and parents. Acceptance of the Youth Guidance Committee services is voluntary on the part of the parents of these children and appears headed for delinquency by their own adjustment problems.

An open house meeting was announced for November 15, a week after the next "very second Tuesday" meeting, at 8:30 at 3342 Grand River. A report of the statistical analysis committee, which analyzes delinquency by section within the city and township, will be presented. Also included will be an explanation of other activities, including a Delinquency Prediction Research Program which has been under way for three years, the Youth Work Committee (job placement), and the proposed "Letterbox" question and answer newspaper column.

All interested Farmington residents are invited, and it is hoped that more members will be recruited to participate.

The Prestons began their business in 1963 by renting their own home to clients because they didn't like to see it standing idle. Now they have available 17 vehicles, including a \$40,000 motor home with heat, heating systems, a carpeted full bath, lounge and full kitchen.

Local Pair's Clients See Country In Style

What started out as a hobby in 1963 has grown into a thriving business for the John Prestons, of 25331 Crystal Spring Court.

That year they bought a \$12,000 trailer home because their four children "... decided we should buy one," said Mrs. Preston.

They traveled to Florida in it and then were left with a \$12,000 home on wheels. "So they decided to rent it out and add night have 17 vehicles ranging up to a \$60,000 motor home, they lease to travelers who want to see the country in style."

One family, the Robert Kelleys of Birmingham, took one to Fairbanks, Alaska, aboard the Alaska Ferry at Prince Rupert with it.

Jack Eckerly, of Eckerly Tool and Manufacturing, on Grand River, is returning today with the \$60,000 vehicle from a hunting trip with seven friends in Broken Bow, Neb.

This motor home has a full, carpeted bath, full kitchen, three heating systems and a lounge. The interior was finished at a cost of \$21,000. It carries \$1 million leasing insurance.

Robert Hall, of Gordon B. Hall and Son, took a smaller unit up to East Lansing last weekend for the Michigan State-Purdue football game.

But it isn't only the sportsmen who rent the motor homes, Mrs. Preston says their clients have included the president of a college, a

dean from the University of Michigan, four priests, some runs, the mayor of Hamtramck, the vice president of Saks Fifth Avenue and Sen. Robert Griffin when he was in the House of Representatives.

Drivers of the homes do have accidents. The U-M dean had one, ending up with an eight to 10 foot hole in the side of the home. The Prestons had him serviced and back on the road within five hours.

When there's trouble with one of the motor homes, the procedure is to call the Prestons here in Farmington because Mrs. Preston says, "We're like a doctor. We know our vehicles and know just what to do."

A lot of retirees rent these homes for more than a leisurely trip. A retiree from Walnut Lake has rented one for six months during which he plans to take his wife all over the South and do some wandering around the west.

Mothers are among the Prestons' clients, also, for shorter trips around the state with their children. They usually rent a smaller 19 and a half foot vehicle.

Some renters have gone as far as Mexico.

The Prestons are still operating this bee hive from their home, but Mrs. Preston says they will be forced into an office by next year.

They are planning a Fort Lauderdale, Fla., office and within two years hope to arrange for vehicles to be dropped off at spots throughout the country. Now a driver is sent to pick up dropped off homes.
