

Guard Exam Deadline Set

Eligible young men are reminded that December 15 is the deadline for submitting applications to compete for appointment as Cadet, U. S. Coast Guard.

The 91st annual competition for admission to the U.S. Coast Guard Academy at New London, Conn., will begin with the December 3 administration of the College Entrance Examination Board Tests. Appointments are made solely on a competitive basis, with no Congressional appointments or geographical quotas. Application deadline for the tests is November 1.

An applicant must be an unmarried high school senior or graduate who has reached his 17th but not his 22nd birthday by July 1, 1967. Applicant must have earned 15 units by June 30, 1967, including the following units: Three in English, two in algebra and one in plane geometry. Applicants must be in excellent physical condition between 64 and 78 inches in height, with proportionate weight.

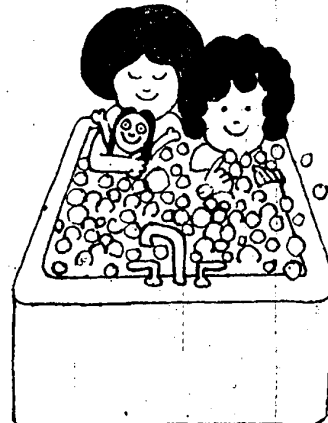
