Norman Davis Due Back
From Vietnam MP Duties

SAIGON — For Specialist Fourth Class Norman C. Davis this war is nearly over. Less than ninety days separate him from home. Of his thirteen months in the Army, nine of them have been spent in Vietnam as a soldier in the 615th Military Police Company attached to the 716th Military Police Battalion on duty here in Saigon. Spec. 4 Davis was graduated from Farmington Senior High and was drafted into the Army. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph B. Davis of 22334 Kirkside Lane, Farmington.

With the increasingly heavy American involvement in this war, the number of military and civilian personnel in the Saigon area has grown to about thirty thousand. The Military Police act as a police force for this American community. In addition, and most importantly, they have the responsibility for protecting all U.S. personnel from Viet Cong terrorism.

In order to furnish this protection, the MP's have developed several tactics which are designed to thwart the VC hit and run attacks. Around every American installation, most of them billets, are concrete emplacements (called "kiosks") which the MP's man on a twenty-four hour a day basis. To support these "static" positions, there are mobile patrols which roam the various districts and are always within hearing distance of the sentries. 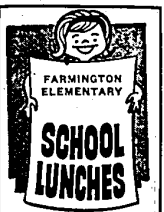
