Undeclared Lancers Farmington High School Move To Semi-Finals Lists Honor Students

On Sunday, Our Lady of Sorrows' Lancers will travel to Benedictine High School to meet a tough St. Cecilia team in the semi-finals of the Catholic Second Division Playoffs. A large cheering section will be welcome.

Our Lady of Sorrows won its seventh straight game by defeating St. Rita 20-0. This victory gave Sorrows a 10-0 record in the playoffs. In the victory, the Lancers' defense was outstanding as it held St. Rita to a minus 43 yards on the ground and a 16 yard romp. Jim Barnes ran for the extra point. This gave Sorrows a 13-0 lead at halftime.

The Lancers took the opening kickoff in the third quarter and marched 62 yards. The scoring play came on Cliff LaFond's 43 yard run around right end. The final touchdown was tallied on a 17 yard sprint by Jim McGrath.

The Lancers have now outscored their opponents 223 to 7 for the year.

Falcons Win Tri-Event

The Falcon cross-country team beat North Farmington and Northville in a tri-event held at North Farmington, November 1.

Farmington won with the low score of 23 points. North Farmington finished second with 33, and Northville was third with 33.

Bob Donovan, in running a time of 9:32, smashed the record of 9:56 previously held by Rick Randall of North Farmington, who also bettered his old record by finishing second in 9:45.

Russ Roth ran third in 10:05, Pete Sevin was fourth in 10:11, Mike Hines seventh in 10:17, Bruce Ridley eighth in 10:20, Bill Harrison tenth in 10:23, and Dick O'Connell was twelfth in 10:28.

The Junior Varsity also won as they pulled an upset victory over North Farmington's J.V., 25-0. At the mile and a half mark, Farmington was three points behind North Farmington, but FHS picked up eight places in the final half mile to win by five points.

The five point victory for Farmington were: Don Cardwell second in a time of 10:10, Don Shires third in 10:30, Mike Atchison fourth in 10:40, Dave Clifford seventh in 10:54, and Bruce Luke was eighth in 10:59.

Coach Jerry Young commented after the meet, "I expected the varsity to beat North Farmington, as we have done it before in the invitational meets, but I was quite surprised to see the Junior Varsity win because it was the first time we have beaten their J.V. this season."
