

# NF JV 'Little Raiders' Zero Out Falcons 20-0

The North Farmington JV, jumped on Farmington early and hung on to crush the home team 20-0.

On the first play from scrimmage quarterback Dave Negri fired a 60 yard touchdown pass to Ron Weber who had a fine afternoon himself with five catches for 121 yards and a touchdown. Negri was named MVP of the game.

The victory marked the "Little Raiders" number seven in a row, and 12th over two years.

This victory was particularly significant in that Coach Herrington's star halfbacks have found their way to the varsity and the coaching staff had to find adequate replacements. People who know football say the real sign of a great team is depth, and North Farmington proved itself truly a great team as Mike Carey filled in at halfback and rushed for 121 yards, with runs of 73 and 34 yards called back.

## Falcons Capture First Old Yule Log Title

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After five years of frustration, it finally happened.

Injuries and a three-game losing streak could not halt an inspired Farmington Falcon football squad from capturing their first victory against a cross-town rival North Farmington.

Playing before a capacity crowd on the Raider field, the Falcons thundered forth to completely dominate the game. In the last second of play, the win, the first for Farmington in the annual Yule Log game, ended Coach Robert Mistle's premiere season with a record of six victories, three losses.

An alert Falcon defense shut out the Raiders of the North. It was this same defensive squad which had been ridden for 23 points in the last three games.

Farmington's offense took advantage of some costly North mistakes in rolling up a total of 234 yards, 148 of these coming on the ground. Junior Dan Wolfman and a

The vaunted North Farmington "Chain Gang" defense held the Falcons after they had received the opening kickoff. North began driving late in the period after both teams had exchanged punts, moving all the way to the 15 yard line. Making the first of several outstanding defensive plays, All-Conference end Jerry Tinkle smothered quarterback Norm Decorey as he attempted to pass, spilling him for an 11-yard loss. The Raiders were forced to attempt a 33-yard field goal which was blocked by its mark.

Taking over at their own 20, the Falcons mounted a scoring drive behind the running play came as Ed Snyder found Tinkle wide open and passed for 25 yards, to the Raider 13 yard line. After he was seemingly stopped, Doug Root exploded for the final yardage by breaking away from three tacklers. Root converted to give Farmington a 7-0 lead.

After stopping North again, Wolfman and Misch went airborne to strike quickly. Taking the snap on the North Farmington 40 yard line, Wolfman clicked on a bullet to Misch, who outran his defender for the TD. The extra point was good.

At the end of the game, Farmington had a 20-0 lead with 2:28 remaining in the half.

## LEGAL NOTICES

**ORDINANCE NO. 40**  
Township of Farmington  
CONFINEMENT OF LIVESTOCK

An ordinance to require that livestock and certain other domestic animals be confined upon the premises of the owner or person in charge thereof and to provide penalties for the violation thereof.

THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON ORDAINED:

SECTION 1. From and after the effective date of this ordinance it shall be the duty of the owner or person in charge of cattle, horses, sheep, swine, poultry or other domestic animals, except dogs and cats, to see that such animals are confined upon the premises of the owner or custodian thereof unless said animals are otherwise under reasonable control of a person of sufficient age and discretion.

SECTION 2. Any person being the owner or custodian of any animal which is not confined as required by this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding \$100.00 or to imprisonment in the County Jail not exceeding 90 days or to both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

SECTION 3. This ordinance is hereby declared adopted by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington on the 20 day of December, 1966 and shall become effective thirty (30) days after publication in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan.

## Biologist Traces Habits Of Migratory Waterfowl

Every fall, Michigan's skies are dotted with ducks and geese departing from the cold north for warmer areas in the south where open water and food are available. The geese fly in distinct V-shaped formations, whereas most of the ducks fly in more irregular, cross-in, wedge-shaped groups.

It is commonly believed that each flock has a special leader, but actually the leader of the V-formation changes from time to time," says Dr. Wayne State University biologist. "Just what determines which bird will be leader at a given time is not known," he says.

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
