Dimes Campaign To Be Launched

"Operation Kickoff" is on the launching pad for the 1967 March of Dimes campaign against crippling birth defects. Kickoff time is 6:30 p.m. Thursday, December 8, at Kingsley Inn, Bloomfield Hills, according to Louis O. Michot, chapter chairman, Pontiac. He further stated that 12 local business firms and individuals will again sponsor the kickoff dinner.

Capacity crowd of 400 March of Dimes volunteers "astronauts" will assemble to hear the Honorable March McElroy, State Attorney General of Ohio, 1959-1963, speak on "The Prevention of Birth Defects."

Dr. Albert A. Canfield, Bloomfield Hills, Dean of Oakland Community College, will be master of ceremonies.

THE "VOLUNTEER" astronauts are the March of Dimes county and community leaders in the campaign divisions of county-wide bowling, skating and golfing benefit tournaments; community general chairmen; community Mothers March chairmen, colonels and captains; Business and Industry leaders; Teens and school chairmen; canister and poster committees; and Wild Game and Tame Dinners committee members.

County, city and school officials will be attending the launching event to represent the entire Oakland County. Members of the Sheriff's Department and Chiefs of Police are again assisting in the "war" on crippling birth defects.

Community service and fraternal organizations will be represented with members of the Eagles, Jaycees, Ex-

change, Kiwanis, Optimist and Junior Women's Clubs.

March of Dimes volunteers and friends of the campaign are requested to present their kickoff invitations at the entrance of the banquet room. Photos will be taken at 6:30 p.m. and dinner will be served at 7:15 p.m.

STATE VOLUNTEER leaders of the March of Dimes attending will be Mrs. Earl Givens, Bloomfield Hills, State Volunteer Women's Advisor and William C. Newberg, Bloomfield Hills, former president of Chrysler Corp. and recently appointed State Volunteer March of Dimes Chairman.

March of Dimes has launched into the immense area of birth defects following the financial support of the discoveries of the Salk polio vaccine, Sabin oral polio vaccine and most recently a measles vaccine.

The county educational program has provided hundreds of medical abstracts and original articles on birth defects to physicians, hospitals and medical libraries, reported Mrs. Charles A. Leach, Birmingham, Chairman of Women's Volunteer Activities Committee. She further reported that pamphlets and brochures have been distributed to school libraries and science departments. Tours to the March of Dimes Birth Defect Center, discussion series and symposiums have created increased volunteer and financial support to the local birth defect program.

The 1967 March of Dimes campaign will take place during the month of January.

200 To Take Part In Band Concert Elks Seek More Toys By Porch Light Drive

The East Junior High Music Department will sponsor a band program Wednesday, December 7, at 8 p.m. in the gymnasium.

The three bands, involving nearly 200 young musicians, are under the direction of Donald P. Keranen.

The program will involve a wide array of music including seasonal selections, classics and semi-popular melodies. The public is invited to attend the concert. There will be a modest admission fee.

The Annual Toys for Tots campaign is expected to be helped considerably this year by a "Porch Light Drive" planned from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Tuesday evening, December 13, at Farmington.

The Farmington Elks Lodge, No. 1886 B. P. O. E., which cooperates with the U.S. Marine Corps and the Goodwills each year to stage the Toys for Tots campaign, plans to have crews out circulating in the neighborhoods the night of Dec. 13 to pick up any toys residents care to donate during the "Porch Light Drive."

This year, due to limited facilities in the temporary building for the Farmington Elks, repairs cannot be made on broken toys. Residents are urged to dig out their toys which are in usable condition. Since the past broken toys accounted for most of those collected for the children of needy families in the community, a greater response is hoped for to provide toys which require no maintenance. Elks Toys for Tots Chair-

man Bill Everhart stated this week that, "In the past, with the help of many generous local citizens, we have been able to meet this challenge each Christmas. Because of the requests we have already received, we are in need of many toys this year for the children of our less fortunate neighbors."

Everhart expressed the hope that citizens of Farmington will again respond to the Toys for Tots Campaign and help assure that no child in the community goes without a Merry Christmas this year. Citizens wishing to donate toys for the special "Porch Light Drive" on Dec. 13 are asked to have their porch lights on between 7 p.m. and 9 p.m. and the toys ready for pickup by the Toys for Tots volunteers who will be covering the neighborhoods at that time.

Clarenceville Swim Classes

The Farmington City Recreation Department in conjunction with the Clarenceville School District began its winter segment of recreational and instructional swimming this past week. The program will be 10 weeks in duration and end on the 14th and 25th of February respectively.

The cost for each hour of recreational swimming is 25 cents per hour for children and 40 cents each hour for adults. Open swimming will be offered on Wednesdays from 7 to 8 p.m. and adults only from 8 to 9 p.m. Two hourly sessions are available on Thursday and Saturday beginning at 7 p.m. On Sundays a family swim will be offered from 2 to 3 p.m. Open swimming on Sunday will be from 3 to 4 p.m. Tuesday is reserved for adult instruction. Classes will take place from 7 to 8 p.m. and 8 to 9 p.m. The cost per ten week session is \$5 and must be paid to the Clarenceville School District at the time of registration at the pool site. Classes began this past Tuesday but applications will still be accepted.

Student instruction will be given on Saturday and the time of class will depend upon the number enrolled. Classes will be limited to 30 students per hour. Each student must be at least 42 inches tall at the shoulder. Registration will be from 9 to 12 noon on Saturday, December 3. Classes will be offered in the following areas: Advanced Beginners, Intermediates, Senior Life Saving, Junior Life Saving, Advanced swimming and Diving.

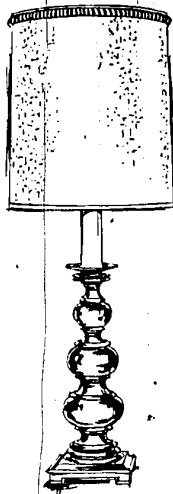
