## Need Gifts For 155 At Lapeer

Lapeer State Home and Training School reveals 1,225 of their children and adults will probably be "forgotten" during the holidays were it not for the interest of public spirited citizens. The institution is responsible for a total of 3,900 individuals.

There are 410 residents from Oakland County at Lapeer State Home, 155 of whom are considered "forgotten." In addition, each year many residents, whom it was presumed would be remembered by family or friends, actually receive no gifts, though generally no one is to be blamed.

This requires a tremendous effort by the staff and others in seeing that each one is remembered. Many items, such as small jars of instant coffee, combs, soap, shampoo, bath powder, wash cloths, men's and women's cosmetics, bill folds, flash-light, crib toys and the like are needed to meet their needs.

Any items left over at Christmas time are valued gifts for use later in the year. Such needs would go unmet except for the generosity of the public. Many individuals and clubs have already offered assistance; however, more are needed to meet the basic needs of this program. Anyone interested in this program should contact the institution's Public Relations Director.

## Tree Farms Pass 69 Million Mark

A total area 20,000 acres, larger than the entire State of Rhode Island, all of it privately owned, tax-paying forest land, was dedicated in October to growing repeated crops of trees as certified Tree Farms.

The new figures mean that nearly one out of every five acres of all privately owned, tax-paying forest land in the United States is now formally certified as a Tree Farm. With the addition of 745,305 acres in October, the American Tree Farm System on November 1 exceeded the 69 million acre mark.

## Foreign Autos To Undergo Tests

Secretary of State James M. Hare said that more than 50 sets of new Michigan plates have been turned over to a section of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to be used on pollution studies on nearly 50 foreign make automobiles.

Hare said the autos, foreign exports from Europe and Japan, will be tested in a new laboratory based temporarily at Willow Run and later to be permanently established in the Ann Arbor area.

The import cars will be tested for "vaping types of pollutants including carbon monoxide levels to determine whether they meet criteria established under the federal 'clean air' act," said Hare.

## Corduroy Takes On New Dimensions

Whatever style you pick for that new winter wardrobe—whether it's Mod, western, or military—you can be sure it's "in" if it's in cotton corduroy. Always a natural favorite for the cold months, corduroy is even more so this year.

Why all the excitement about a fabric that has been around since the days of the American Revolution? For one thing, corduroy takes beautifully to the contemporary lines of fashion that require a full-bodied fabric. . . a lotly look. It interprets the Mod styling, the Western influence, or the military trend with equal aplomb.

BUT MORE THAN that, corduroy has taken on new dimensions. At a time when the fashion world has gone daff over prints, corduroy has met the challenge and come up with some of the season's singiest. Stripes, florals, geometrics, paisleys . . . you name it and you'll find it in corduroy.

Another reason for corduroy's dominance is the wealth of its wales. Where only one or two different wales used to prevail, now there's an abundance of varieties. One major textile firm, for example, produces 26 distinct types—ranging from fine wales (2½ to the inch) to bulky ones (four to the inch). In between, there are the corduroys that combine thick and thin ribs for an unusual look . . . and some with wavy or novelty-cut ribs for a sculptured effect.

Add to this the different weights of corduroy and it's easy to see why the fabric is enjoying so much popularity this season. The lighter weights have a lustrous, velvety appearance; while the heavier weights come in deep colors which appear unusually rich and vibrant due to the loft.

How can you keep corduroy new looking? All-cotton corduroy is one of the original easy-care fabrics that can be both washed and dried by machine with little or no ironing required.

To give corduroy a better appearance after a washing, however, the National Cotton Council suggests that you gently brush the pile down with a soft brush while the fabric is still damp. Or give it a light once-over with the iron on the wrong side. Put a cotton Terry towel on the ironing board to cushion the pile and keep it from matting.

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## Local Dancers Selected for Concert Ballet

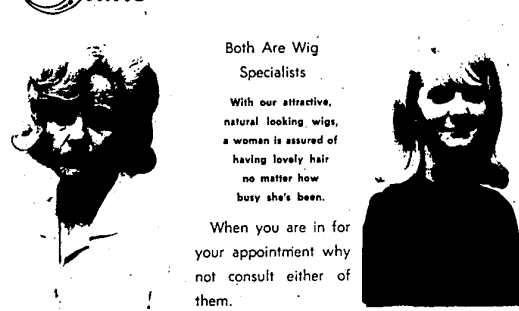
On Sunday, November 27, Mrs. Jeanne Hinoje, director of the Flint Civic Ballet, auditioned students for the Suburban Concert Ballet.
