

Kiwanians Ask 'Stamps For Toys' In Farmington

Kendallwood Kiwanis Club in cooperation with the Kiwanis Clubs of Metropolitan Detroit and Radio Station WXYZ are again collecting Trading Stamps to be redeemed for toys for underprivileged children. The Stamp collecting campaign is to run through Dec. 20.

The stamps may be of any kind and any quantity—from a few loose stamps to many books. Persons wishing to give stamps are asked to mail loose stamps or books of stamps to: WXYZ Radio Stamp: For TOYS, Box 19, Detroit, Michigan 48219, or to drop them off at WXYZ Radio Station on 10 Mile Road at James Souzen's Hwy.

Last year the Kiwanis-WXYZ Radio campaign netted more than 20,000 books and thousands of loose stamps contributed by generous persons from the entire Metropolitan area.

The list of Kids for Toys is nearly complete and this year Kendallwood Kiwanis hopes to distribute more than 300 toys to needy children in the greater Farmington area.

New Police Academy for Oakland County Officers

As a result Oakland County police officers formed a second committee, and selected Pontiac Police Chief William K. Hanger and Birmingham Chief Ralph Moxley as co-chairmen. The committee approached the community college which agreed to co-sponsor the program in conjunction with their school of police science at the Auburn Hills campus in Pontiac Township.

Associate professor of police science, Eugene M. Freeman, said the community college will coordinate the program and give it some faculty support.

The curriculum will consist of 120 hours of training. Freeman said. Current plans, he explained, call for two training programs a year, one in March and one in October.

Hanger, chairman of a curriculum subcommittee, said that because the program could not be financed by the county, tuition will be paid by participating police departments.

"The granting of college credit for recruit training should be an incentive for officers to continue their education toward a degree on their own time," Hanger said.

He said this type program should be a boost to the increased emphasis on the "police man as a professional man."

The recruit school will be open to all agencies in the county, he said, and where there is room, officers from other counties may be allowed to participate.

"Many smaller communities in the county haven't been able to give their officers any formal training and we're hoping that they will be able to use this facility."

Hanger said that if the program complies with the requirements established for such programs under the Michigan Law Enforcement Training Council, local police departments will be reimbursed up to 50 per cent of the recruits' salaries by the state.

"Our ultimate objective is to have a 48 or 50 week continuing academy program at the college," Hanger added.

"It is quite obvious that the recruit in police work today is more and better training," Moxley said. "Too many departments have no training at all."

"We want to go on further than just basic training in this new program. After the first academy courses we want to begin week-long refresher courses for in-service officers," Moxley said.

Included in these courses would be training in accident investigation, traffic law enforcement, disaster control, riot control, a two-week course in investigative techniques and a supervisor training and police management program.
