Rich In Litter**

Would you believe nearly 500 cans and bottles were found in a one-mile section of I-94 during a highway litter survey?

The State Highway Commission reports that 489 cans and bottles—and a lot of other things—were picked up by a Highway Department maintenance crew as part of a national litter survey.

The survey, taken on a one-mile section of eastbound I-94 between Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti, turned up: Two cubic yards of waste paper, 357 cans, 132 bottles, 92 auto parts and accessories, 24 items of clothing including shoes and trousers, 60 miscellaneous items and some lumber.

Fifty-nine of the bottles were of the "no-deposit, no-return" variety. Broken bottles were not counted.

Last month, the Highway Commission reported that roadside clean-up costs have doubled during the last five years—from \$122,000 in 1960 to \$243,701 during 1965.

Michigan State Police holiday patrols will be operated during the New Year weekend in special efforts to reduce accidents, Col. Frederick E. Davids, department director, reported.

Emphasizing that the state is headed toward a new annual high in traffic deaths, Colonel Davids urged motorists to exercise greater care in following safety rules and practices.

"The holiday season should be an inspiration to every driver and pedestrian to do whatever he can to reduce the risk of an accident," he said. Extra hours of darkness, frequently bad weather and road conditions and the drinking associated with holiday celebrations are factors which add hazards at this time of the year, he noted.

State Police patrols will provide maximum coverage from 3 to at least 9 p.m. each day of the holiday periods, with special attention to highway sections with bad accident experience. Department planes will assist in the patrols during daylight hours, weather permitting.

New Year period fatalities totaled 33 a year ago and 22 in 1964-65.
