A regular meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington was held on December 19, 1966.

The meeting called to order at 8:04 p.m. by Mayor Brotherton.

ROLL CALL: Mayor Brotherton, Councilmen Allen, Peterson, Thayer and Yoder present. ABSENT: None.

CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: City Manager Dinan, Clerk Quinn, Attorney Kelly, Chief Deadman and Director DeBene.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING

Motion by Yoder seconded by Thayer that the minutes of regular meeting of the City Council held on December 5, 1966 be approved as published. Motion carried, all ayes.

Decision of Council on Rezoning Lots 4 thru 7, excepting the North 115 feet, Eberhart's Pl. to R-1, Single Family, to R-1P, Residential Parking District.

Mayor Brotherton stated that a Public Hearing on the above described rezoning request had been held on December 5, 1966 and assumed that the Council would make a decision at this meeting.

Should the Council be advised by Peterson to approve the rezoning of Lots 4 thru 7, excepting the North 115 feet, Eberhart's Pl. to R-1P, Single Family, to R-1P, Residential Parking District.

AYES: Allen, Peterson, Yoder.

NAYS: Brotherton, Thayer. Motion carried.

Prior to roll call Councilman Thayer read a prepared statement objecting to the rezoning.

The questioned what price expected to pay for this progress and why tax paying homeowners should be continued to be taxed in favor of commercial and parking expansion.

He stated that because one lot is now being rezoned commercial property before he investigated the permitted use, why should these homeowners' property values and mode of living be put in jeopardy. He stated that he would remain residential and object to rezoning.

Councilman Thayer called this irresponsible spot zoning and stated that the City Council should not be asked to vote of confidence and deny this rezoning request.

Councilman Yoder stated that he was not making a request serious thought and was of the opinion that the lot should be rezoned to a parking lot and if the rezoning is approved, a wall would be built and the lot would be rezoned R-1P if the lot may remain residential.

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Exhibit Traces Centuries Of Pharmaceutical Aids

While pharmaceuticals today are a booming business, a single apothecary in the Sung Dynasty of China—3,000 years ago—sold \$10,000 worth of drugs a day.

For centuries, 20,000 years, men have been using plants, roots and herbs for healing. This year's visitor to Disneyland can take a close-up look at medical progress from nostrums and hexes to neomycin and hydrocortisone. The mythical journey made possible by a dramatic display arranged by The Upjohn Company in conjunction with its Disneyland display is a journey through the ages, an apothecary shop redolent of the late 19th century.

The ancient's knowledge about the curative value of certain plants didn't prevent the Shaman, priest, physician and sorcerer from using them as well.

THE FIRST DRUGSTORE in the U.S. was founded in Philadelphia in 1729 by an Irish immigrant, Christopher Marshall. For a hundred years, the Marshall Apothecary was an important drug manufacturing concern and training school for apprentice pharmacists.

During the American Revolution, the store was an important supply depot for the Continental Army.

Marshall's had little in common with the modern drug store. As the Upjohn display demonstrates, a scientific revolution was needed to convert alchemy into chemistry and the craft of medicine to the science of healing.
