The meeting was conducted by the Scoutmaster Harold Bassman and was assisted by committeeman Robert Goshorn.

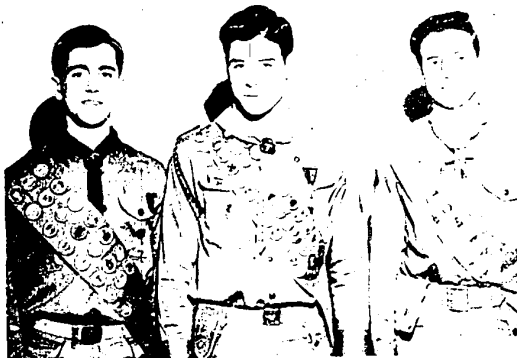

children on recreational and educational trips."

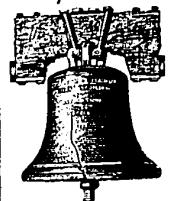

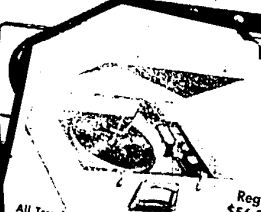

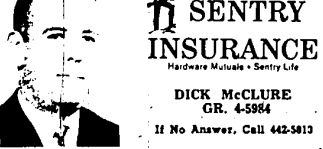
