Because there really is no glory in it, nothing really for the "publicity money."

The rewards are these: personal satisfaction that you helped a team through an entire season, taping scores of arms and legs, patching up cuts and making sure that Mike Ames has his plastic duck to play with in the whirlpool. But to Greg Smith, a junior and trainer for the Falcon basketball team, it's all worth it.

Greg Smith, better known as "Smitty," first became interested in training in the ninth grade when he realized that he was not destined to be a basketball star. Instead of quitting sports, he decided to try his hand as trainer of the junior high basketball team.

He quickly was accepted and became so interested in it that he took a correspondence course from a school in Kansas, helping him gain a better knowledge in the field. His experience in ninth grade made it easy for him to become trainer for the varsity basketball team at FHS when he entered tenth grade.

Smith's job is enormous. He wraps ankles of some of the basketball players before practice and each game, treats

cuts, makes sure that first aid equipment is on hand for each of the games, and keeping the players in good physical health. This involves as much time, if not more than the basketball player himself.

When Smith finishes high school, he plans to become a professional trainer. He wants to go to Western Michigan University and take physical therapy courses. After two years there, he plans to transfer to University of Michigan to get his Bachelor of Science degree.

Asked the worst injury he has ever treated he said, "Mike Ames. He had a broken talbone that I 'fixed' and I bandaged his hand when he jammed a glass tube through it in chemistry."

A regular meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington was held on January 3, 1967.

Meeting called to order at 8:05 p.m. by Mayor Brotherton.

HOLL CALL: Mayor Brotherton, Councilmen Allen, Peterson, Thayer and Yoder present.

CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: City Manager Dinan, City Engineer, City Clerk, Chief Deam and Director DeBaene.

PREVIOUS MEETING  
Motion by Peterson seconded by Yoder that the minutes of regular meeting of the Council held on December 19, 1966 be approved as published.

MINUTE HEARINGS  
A. Vacation of Oakland Avenue from Longacre Road to West Line of Woodcroft Subdivision.

NEW SECTION WHICH SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS 176, CHAPTER 4, OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY DEPARTMENT.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:  
Section 1. Minimum Standards Adopted. The minimum employment standards for law enforcement officers as established and adopted by the Michigan Law Enforcement Officers Training Council in accordance with Act No. 18, Public Acts of 1966, hereafter adopted as follows:

(Standards)

Be a citizen of the United States.

Minimum age of twenty-one years, with a maximum age of thirty-one years, which may be waived by the hiring authority if the applicant has previous law experience.

Graduation from high school or equivalent. Equivalent defined as having attained a passing score on the General Education Development test indicating high school graduation.

Fingerprinting of applicants with a search of local, state and national fingerprint files to disclose any criminal record.

The applicant shall not have been convicted of a felony offense.

Good moral character as determined by a favorable report following a comprehensive background investigation of the applicant's school and employment records, home environment, personal traits and integrity. Consideration will be given to any and all violations, including traffic and conservation law convictions indicating a lack of good character.

Acceptable physical, emotional and mental fitness as established by a licensed physician following examination of the applicant. This examination is free from any physical, emotional or mental condition which might adversely affect his performance of duty as a police officer.

The training shall possess normal hearing and normal color vision. He shall be free from any impulsive or unbalanced behavior and visual acuity in each eye correctable to 20-20.

He shall be free from 20-40 uncorrected vision in either eye. The training must be physically sound and developed physically, with a minimum height of 5'8" without a shoe and a weight within 10 percent of and to age as indicated by accepted medical standards.

He shall be free from any physical defects, chronic diseases, mental defects, organic or functional conditions, or mental instabilities which may impair or affect the performance of duty to which might endanger the lives of others or himself or be likely to reflect unfavorably on the qualifications.

A declaration of the applicant's medical fitness shall become a part of the background investigation. The information shall be available to the examining physician.

A written examination shall be given by the hiring authority or his representative to determine the applicant's acceptability for a police officer position.

An oral interview shall be held by the hiring authority or his representative to determine the applicant's acceptability for a police officer position and to determine his aptitude, background and ability to communicate.

Recruitment and employment procedures and standards shall be in compliance with existing Michigan statutes governing 1966, as amended.

Section 2. Notice to be published.

The City Clerk shall publish this ordinance in the manner required by law.

Section 3. Conflicting Ordinance Repealed. The standards of the Michigan Law Enforcement Officers Training Council as organized as minimum standards and higher standards are recommended by the Training Council when qualified applicants are available. Any portion of any ordinance which sets a minimum standard is hereby repealed.

A portion of any ordinance which sets a minimum standard or exceeds those standards shall remain in effect.

Section 4. This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Council on December 19, 1966, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting on January 3, 1967 and will become effective January 24, 1967.

# Choking Child Saved by Two City Policemen

Two Farmington City Policemen helped save an infant's life Sunday when notified at 10 a.m. by a telephone operator that the boy was choking.

Sgt. Jay Harrison answered the call from the Thomas Hattat home, 3188 Folkstone Drive, with the police emergency van containing resuscitator equipment. Patrolman William Berman arrived in a second car.

They found Mrs. Halpat with her son, David, 1 1/2, in the kitchen. Mrs. Halpat was giving David mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Harrison cleared the baby's throat, and Berman applied resuscitation.

Not waiting for an ambulance, the two wrapped David in a blanket and took him by scooter car to Totoford General Hospital, applying resuscitation on the way.

Berman radioed ahead to have an emergency crew stand by at Botsford.

Hospital spokesmen say the baby's throat was clogged with mucus. Mrs. Halpat thought he had swallowed something because he was eating breakfast when his difficulty began.

Before Harrison and Berman left Botsford, David had begun to cry and move around.

Farmington Police answer approximately 145 such calls a year.
