

Committee Named by Probus Club

A seven-man committee has been named to serve as judges for the Fifth Annual Probus Club Award for Academic Achievement at Wayne State University.

The committee members, three from the Detroit community and four from the Probus Club, are: Richard E. Cross, chairman of the executive board of American Motors and senior partner in the law firm of Cross, Wrock, Miller, Vieson and Kelley; Judge George Edwards of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit; and Willis F. Woods, director, the Detroit Institute of Arts.

Probus Club members on the committee are Herbert Kaufman, Huntington Woods; Charles Perlman, Detroit; Martin K. Stein, Detroit; and Circuit Judge John M. Wise, Detroit. Arthur J. Rubiner, Birmingham, is serving as non-voting chairman of the committee.

Two awards will be given, each consisting of a \$500 grant without restrictions. One will be for a faculty member in the natural sciences (and related professions) and another for a representative of the humanities (including social sciences and allied fields).

Criteria for the selection of winners will include their academic and professional background and exceptional scholastic and research work. Awards will be made at the Annual Probus Award Dinner, Saturday, Feb. 18.

The physical therapist offered the child a lollipop and the toddler reached for it with his left hand. "You know better than that Billy," the therapist said. The little boy looked guilty for a moment, shook his head and then reached for the candy with his other "hand."

You would have to see Billy to appreciate this story—you see, he was born with only one arm. His left arm is an artificial device that was fitted to him at the state health department's Area Child Amputee Center in Grand Rapids.

The center provides artificial limbs especially designed for children's individual needs. The charge for the services is based upon the family's ability to pay. However, no child goes without needed treatment regardless of his parents' financial standing.

A pioneer in its field, the center was started in 1946 under the sponsorship of the Crippled Children Commission in the Mary Free Bed Hospital and Orthopedic Center in Grand Rapids. The Commission's functions were transferred to the Department of Public Health by the Reorganization Act of 1955. Since that time the center has served 936 patients from Michigan and 24 other states, two positions and three foreign countries. Children from outside of Michigan are treated through a federal grant which allows the youngsters to seek treatment at the center if resources are not available in their area.

April 25-extra master point game; April 28-Open Pairs and club's third anniversary; September 20-extra master point game.

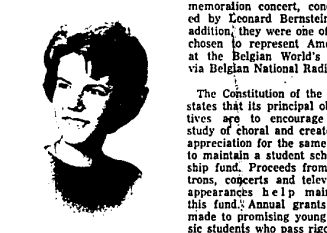

The three-year awards are intended to support graduate study leading to the Ph.D. or equivalent degree in various fields of study.

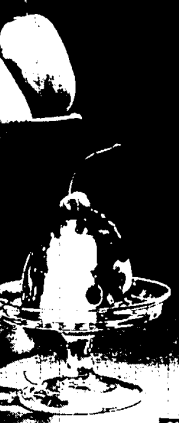
