Beulah Trombley, Clerk of Farmington Municipal Court, attended the Michigan Municipal Court Clerks' Association winter meeting at Midland, Michigan on January 13 and 14. The meeting was held in the Grace A. Dow Memorial Library.

Host was Edward Rinn, clerk of Midland Municipal Court. The president of the association is Shaker Brackett, clerk of the Flint Municipal Court. Principal speaker at the meeting was Senator Robert Richardson, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee.

The principal item on the agenda was the continued discussion of the proposed lower court reorganization bills to be submitted to the legislature early in the 1967 session. The new Michigan constitution required the formation of a new lower court system to be effective by January 1, 1969.

Such a court system would absorb all of the 93 municipal courts in Michigan, all of the many justices of the peace, common pleas court of Detroit and the circuit court commissioners. The legislature is expected to enact the proposed legislation in final form in time to permit the judges of the proposed lower courts to run for office in the general election of 1968.

Cook-and-Serve Economy: Wiener Marzetti

WIENER MARZETTI
1 pkg. (1 lb.) Oscar Mayer Wieners
1 cups tomato juice
1 envelope (1 1/2 oz.) dry onion soup mix

8 ounces noodles, uncooked
1/2 cup (2 oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese

Heat tomato juice to boiling in medium size skillet and blend in onion soup mix. Add noodles. Bring mixture to boil, then reduce heat and simmer 15 minutes. Cover and simmer 5 minutes longer. Sprinkle with grated cheese just before serving. Makes 4 to 5 servings.
