

New at the Library

Benjamin Diersell said, "The more extensive a man's knowledge of what has been done, the greater will be his power of knowing what to do."

The library has recently added a number of recommended books dealing with the growth of civilization. The most comprehensive book is Leo Deuel's "Testament of Time: The Search for Lost Manuscripts." Writing in one form or another came to Near East some 6,000 years ago. Many records were lost through man's negligence, and vanishing civilizations. This is an account of man's search for and deciphering of records of the past 100 to 200 years—a story of books, living and lost, born and yet to be born. Deuel's book covers the records of Europe, Asia, Africa and the New World.

Yigael Yadin's book "Masada" covers only the Holy Land and is a description of the excavation of the Judean desert rock fortress of Masada. This excavation uncovered the biggest collection of Jewish and Roman coins of the first century ever found, as well as Herod's three-tiered palace.

"The Jews in their Land," conceived and edited by David Ben-Gurion is a lavishly illustrated volume with 117 pages of illustrations and maps scattered throughout its 400 pages, presenting the continuing story of the Jewish people within their own borders. Beginning with a re-

logical description, the book moves on to offer views of the exodus from Egypt, the writing of the prophets, and the desperate struggle for survival in a land overrun by a succession of great powers. It concludes with a section written by Ben-Gurion himself that records the birth of modern Israel and its fight for identity and independence as a nation.

Noteworthy on the European scene is a new book on Ireland, by Edwin Smith. There is scant material available on ancient Ireland, so this is a welcome addition as it covers Ireland's history, traditions, legends, landscapes, language and arts.

"Time-Life Magazines have come up with a new series called "The Great Ages of Man," history of the world's cultures. Most of the volumes are now available:

- 1—"Ancient Greece," edited by Sir Maurice Bowra, who has devoted his life to the contemplation of Greek literature, art and sociology.
- 2—"African Kingdoms," which covers the 16th to 19th centuries, as well as the cultures of the world's great empires.
- 3—"Age of Enlightenment," edited by Peter Gay. Gay has managed to cover the full range of culture of the 18th century without getting too bogged down in detail and focuses on the revolutionary ideas which we are still struggling for or against today.
