Film Answers Questions on Sex

A helpful approach to informing parents of how and when facts on sex can be communicated to children is now available on film, according to Dr. Frederick J. Margolis, director of the Wayne State University Medical Audio-Visual Unit.

Called "Parent to Child about Sex," the 30-minute film according to Dr. Margolis, reveals ways of meeting the parental dilemma of answering children's questions and opening comfortable communication lines to prevent later problems.

Material in the script is based on actual parent-child experiences. Consultation with experts in education, religion and medicine has developed a realistic approach to sex instruction, Dr. Margolis said.

Suggested audiences are parents (including PTA's, service clubs and other civic groups), high school and college students, teacher education classes, physician and nurse training programs and expectant parent sessions.

Detroit Library Airmen Winston Cards Available Visits Parents

Detroit Library cards will be available to all residents of a tri-county area encompassing Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties as of February 1. Only the facilities of the main branch library will be involved in the program.

A two-year research-demonstration project is now under way which will decide the feasibility of extending the courtesy of Detroit Library usage even farther to the remainder of the six-county metropolitan region. The study is a result of a federal grant to Wayne State University under the Higher Education Act.

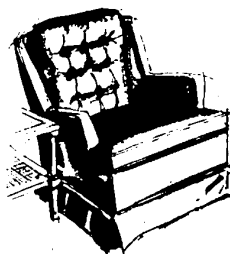

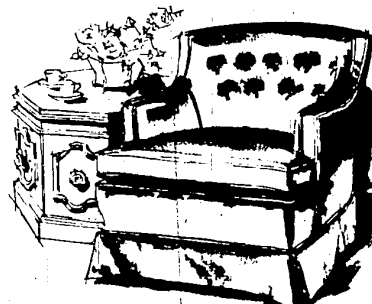

1967 - "The Year of the Curve-Type Hairstyles"

What's in store for '67? Variations on the "curve theme" promoted by the N.H.C.A. Salon patrons are going for curves in a big way.

To create the curve-type style, the cut is of utmost importance. The hair is cut short with the bulk thinned out, and then recut to blunt the ends. When cutting, look for the natural lay of the hair and blend the hair to move with it.

When setting the hair, mold the bangs, sides and back into place, and hold with tape. Only six to eight rollers are used in the top to give height and fullness to the finished style.

The hair is brushed thoroughly after the rollers are removed, and then backbrushed gently and smoothed with a comb to create the style lines.

Most women who are wearing their hair in these new styles would prefer to avoid any excess curl. For this reason, they may be avoiding permanent waves - or perhaps they have never even tried a perm.

The curve-type styles that our patrons are requesting need support. Hair styling and setting lotions will not, by themselves, make salon styles last from one appointment to the next. They can help, but only a curve-type underpinning which is put into the hair can make the casual styles look better and last longer.
