City Population Rises By 227

The City of Farmington's population has grown officially by 227 and unofficially by 308 persons.

And it will pick up \$2,000 to \$3,000 more from state gas and weight taxes, the sales tax, and the intangible tax.

The reason is the annexation of 437 acres on the city's west side late last year. The City Council and the Farmington Township Board agreed formally in the last two weeks on the number of persons in the annexed area.

HERE'S HOW the population estimates were made:

Both sides agreed there were about 308 persons currently living in the annexed area. The Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission estimates the township's pre-annexation population at 34,465. That means the area annexed to the city had 0.83 per cent of the township's population.

Considering that the township's census in 1960 was 25,526, then 0.83 per cent amounts to 227 persons — the official number of persons in the area annexed to the city.

The census gives the city a 1960 population of a little less than 7,000. Current guesses put it at the 10,000 mark.

IN OTHER actions affecting the newly annexed area, the City Council last Monday:

Gave final approval to two new zoning classifications — R-1C (country estates), to require minimum lot sizes of 15,000 square feet with at least 100 feet of width, and R-1D (planned unit development), which would allow lots as small as 90 by 120 feet if sufficient open space were provided.

Amended the zoning map to cover the annexed area, putting Woodcroft Subdivision in R-1C and Chatham Hills in R-1D.

Rabies Clinic Set Saturday, Feb. 18

County officials will hold a rabies clinic Saturday, Feb. 18, in the Farmington Township fire department hall.

P. R. Bates, veterinarian with the county animal welfare division, said that although no dog rabies cases have been reported in Oakland County for two years, there have been two cases of skunk rabies in the Farmington area—pointing to the need to protect dogs from being infected by a skunk bite.

Last year, he said, 272 violation tickets were issued in the Farmington area. The most common violation is failure to keep dogs under reasonable control.

Dog owners may also have their pets immunized by private veterinarians and should secure licenses at the township hall prior to March 1, after which the price will increase.
