After winning 24 straight, the grapplers went on to finish on top in the first Wayne-Oakland quadrangular meet. The participating teams included Bloomfield Hills, Clarksville, Clarkston, and the host school, Northville.

SEVEN OF the 12 Trojan starters ended up first place finishers: Bryan Levy (103), Don Yitlalo (112), Raymond Wehner (127), Carl Watkins (131), David Kaipio (138), Steve Clark (145) and Craig McDougal (165).

Lightweight Larry Black, 122-pounder Wayne Bailey and Dennis Russo at 157 gained second places, while Joel Siegel (180) and heavyweight Larry Pynne rounded out the scoring in third place.

In overall team points, Clarksville led with 192 followed by Northville with 173. Bloomfield Hills had 70 and Clarkston had 60.

THE TEAM is looking forward to regionals on Feb. 24-25 in Flat Rock. Last year they were narrowly beat out by Romulus for second place. River Rouge finished first.

Three members of the team went on to the state meet last year—David Kaipio, Don Yitlalo and Ray Wehner.

On Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. the wrestlers will play host to Redford Union.

Parking Ban City Approval Proposed For Winter Expected On 1st Labor Contract

Farmington City councilmen are expected to approve the city's first labor contract with employees Feb. 20.

The contract proposal has already been approved by Local 1456 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL.

From the audience, James A. Platt, 2039 Meadowlark, agreed in principle with Peterson, but pointed to one possible complication—some residents with more than one car may lack off-street parking space for the second car.

Councilmen nodded agreement to Peterson's praise of the work of city public works crews in removing snow after the Jan. 30-31 blizzard.

GR-Sherwood Zone Change OK'd By City

The City Council has made a zoning change requested by Ford Motor Co., for a Lincoln-Mercury agency on Grand River near Sherwood.

With Councilman John Allen dissenting, the Council gave to 1 approval for a change from Zone R-1-P (customer parking) to C-2 (commercial). The change will allow property on the south side of Grand River to be used for auto storage.


The change had been opposed at a public hearing last month by homeowners on Sherwood, but city officials saw it as a way to get rid of some sub-standard buildings on the site.

A fired-up North Farmington High School basketball squad upset its cross-town rival, first-place Farmington, 63-53.

The NFHS Raiders had the advantage of playing on the home court in last Saturday night's encounter.

The Falcons took a 16-13 first quarter lead. But in the second stanza, good rebound work by John Mann, Rick Knock and Ron Flutur helped the Raiders knot the score at 30-all.

Rebounds proved the deciding factor. North had 61 to the Falcons' 47 for the entire game.

In the third quarter, North scored 15 points to Farmington's 10 to break the tie, and in the last quarter had a 10-point margin.

Raider captain Jim Rulapaugh and Falcon center Mike Ames were high point men with 19 each. North's John Mann had 11 and Mike McCoy and Rick Knock 10 each. Farmington played without the services of top scorer Greg Dorow, who had a shoulder injury.

North Team FHS Cagers Facing To Face C'ville 5 Conference Showdown

Farmington High School will close its basketball season with three contests, including a showdown battle against the number two team in the conference.

The Falcons will travel to Walled Lake Feb. 17. Then on Feb. 20, they will battle it out for the conference title with Pontiac Northern; that game was postponed because of the Jan. 27 snowstorm.

The season will close with a Feb. 24 contest at home against Roseville.

At mid-week, the Falcons stood at 8-5 for the season but had a sparkling 5-0 record in conference play.

FHS dropped a non-league tilt Jan. 28 against Plymouth, 61-57, but they recovered a week later to edge a strong Waterford squad, 49-48.

Farmington High School's wrestling Falcons won one and lost one in the last week by similar scores.

The Falcons have one dual meet left this season—Feb. 14, when they play host to Fitz Gerald at 7:30 p.m. Matches are open to the public.
