Rev. Pelham Takes Four Month Leave

Farmington Episcopalians bid temporary farewell to their rector last week. The Rev. Joseph A. Pelham, rector of Trinity Church, began a four months leave of absence during which he will be proctor fellow in residence at the Episcopal Theological School in Cambridge, Mass.

One of the official seminars of the Episcopal Church, it was given a sum of \$300,000 two years ago to establish a clergy sabbatical program.

In his absence, the Rev. Everett W. Francis will act as priest-in-charge of Trinity Church. Associate director of program for the Diocese of Michigan, he will serve Trinity Church on a half-time basis while continuing his work for the diocese.

Rev. Pelham, who received a bachelor of divinity cum laude from the Episcopal Theological School in 1955, will study the second semester of the academic year. He will return in mid-June.

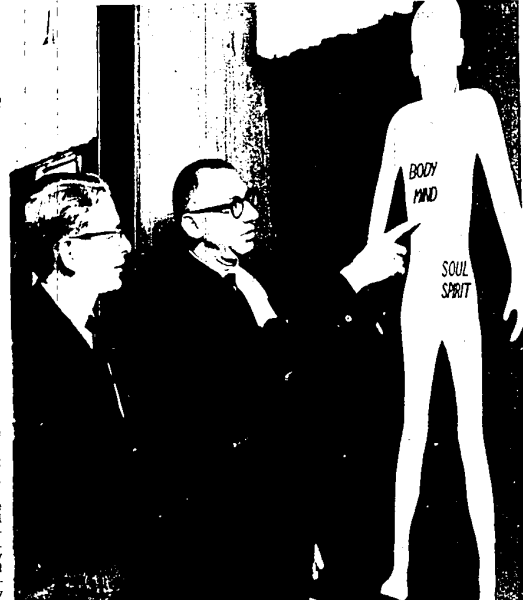

"This is consistent with my conviction that the clergy need to become more knowledgeable about the world and how it operates, as well as more knowledgeable about current efforts toward renewal in the church."

YMCA Offers Sex Info

An evening program of three sessions on sex education will be conducted under the sponsorship of the Farmington area YMCA at O. E. Dunckel Junior High School for youth of junior high age and their parents. Classes will begin promptly at 7 p.m. on February 16, 23 and March 2.

Dr. Edwin Blumberg and Rev. Carl Kallreider will share the teaching duties. Dr. Blumberg is a practicing physician in Farmington, and Rev. Kallreider is pastor of the Antioch Lutheran Church here.

The first session will deal with growth and development, physical changes, emotional changes and their effects. Some popular misconceptions will be eradicated.

Second session will concern itself with the business of maturing socially and spiritually as well as with facts about human reproduction.

Third session will be an informal discussion for parents on how they can better communicate with the younger generation and interpret the information made available by the instructional program.

A prisoner of the Simbas in Stanleyville during the rebel uprising of 1964, Mr. Larsen and his wife were rescued by paratroopers.

The evening speaker will be the Rev. James L. Johnson, engaged in distributing evangelical literature world-wide, who will show a film at 6:30 and speak at the 7 p.m. service. Special music under the direction of Douglas Bayne will be featured in the evening.

Weeknight meetings will begin Monday at 7:30 p.m. with the Rev. Ray Loyola, of Latin America, showing pictures and speaking. His pictures will include scenes of the Revolutions in the Dominican Republic.
