

5 Wins At C'Ville

Seek Stiffer Parking Rules At Dealerships

Farmington Planning Commission has recommended three ordinance amendments to the City Council. Members adopted the resolutions at their meeting Monday night.

Recommended was a change in parking requirements at auto dealerships. Commission opinion is that requirements can be strengthened.

The suggested change is that the current one parking space (for both employees and customers) for every 500 square feet of floor space be increased to one space for every 300 square feet of floor space.

Offset parking for new used car lots was recommended to be changed to one parking space for employee and customer parking for each five display spaces.

Also recommended was a change in wall and greenbelt requirements between multiple dwellings, commercial establishments and residential areas.

A time limit before issuance of certificate of occupancy was recommended in which decorative walls and greenbelts must be installed.

If weather holds up installation, the developer must submit a cash bond at 100 per cent of cost.

in the subdivision in a manner approved by the City.

3. The area to be dedicated for the common use of the subdivision shall be no less than two (2) acres and shall be in a location and shape approved by the City.

Provided a parcel divided by a road or stream shall be considered as one parcel.

4. Access shall be provided to areas dedicated for the common use of the subdivision for those lots not bordering on such dedicated areas by means of streets or pedestrian accessways.

5. To approving the application of the "Planned Unit Development," the City Council shall consider the following objectives:

a. To provide a more desirable living environment by preserving the natural character of open fields, stands of trees, brooks, hills and similar natural assets.

b. To encourage developers to use a more creative approach in the development of residential areas, thereby designing safety into the street pattern.

c. To encourage a more efficient, aesthetic and desirable use of open area while recognizing a reduction in development costs and by allowing the developer to bypass natural obstacles on the site.

d. To encourage the provision of open space within reasonable distance of all lot development and to further encourage the development of recreational facilities and areas.

6. Under this planned unit approach, the developer or subdivisor shall dedicate the total park area (See Item 2 above) at or before the time of filing of the final plat on all or any portion of the plat.

7. Application for approval of a Planned Unit Development shall be submitted at the time of submission of the proposed plat for approval as required by the State Plat Act and the Subdivision Regulations.
