North Farmington matmen finished a solid third at the Conference meet held last Saturday at Thurston High School. The Raiders amassed 39 points, trailing far behind the winner, Thurston, who totaled 55 points. John Glenn finished at second with 33.

Four North Farmington wrestlers made it to the finals. Sophomore Rick Chapman, at 25 lbs., lost 1-0 in overtime; while another sophomore, Hector Castaneda, at 112 lbs., lost in overtime on a referee's decision. Junior Dan Haller, at 120 lbs., was the Raider's only conference champion, winning on a decision 4-2. Senior Lance Oak came very close to victory in his match, but was pinned at the 5:30 mark while leading 2-0.

The good luck is that North Farmington extended its undefeated string with victories over Chippewa Valley and Ann Arbor.

C'Ville Cagers Win 2 In League

The Clarenceville basketball team rounded up the weekend the right way by breezing past two league opponents, gaining their fourth win in the last five league contests. The only loss was to Clarkson, the league leader, which has not lost a league game this season.

The first Trojan win was over the Holly Bulldogs. Holly led at halftime, 25-23, but domination of the boards by Ron Ray, John Thompson, and Jon McClory helped bring the Trojans back in the groove.

With only seconds remaining, Clarenceville's Chuck Watkins was fouled, converting both shots. Milford got possession of the ball and was fouled with one second left on the scoreboard clock. The foul shots were also converted but the buzzer rang with the Trojans in the lead, 49-47.

Jon McClory played a fine defensive game, holding Holly star Greg Averyhart, previously averaging 22 points a game, to three points.

Ronnie Ray was tops with 18 points on eight baskets and two free throws, plus 21 rebounds. Teammate, John Thompson, followed with 13 points and 12 rebounds. Mark Diendorf chipped in 10 while Chuck Watkins added seven.

THE FOLLOWING night, Clarenceville was in the shooting category and a sharing of scoring led the Trojans to a win over West Bloomfield's Lakers, 74-51.

Twelve of the 14 Trojans scored and the shooting average was 55 per cent. The Lakers left the floor at halftime with a 29-21 deficit. Clarenceville completely over-powered their opponents in the third period, scoring 28 points, all on baskets.

Thompson paced Clarenceville with 22 points on 11 baskets. Ron Ray netted 11 while Jim Amick and Chuck Watkins had eight apiece.

Bob Duman connected for six and Mike Nye got five. Gordie Schmitt scored three, and Mark Diendorf, Tom Harborne, and Bryan Kent added two each. Jon McClory and Dave Wilson each had one.

Falcons Give Up Title

The record books will say that Pontiac Northern beat Farmington 48-45 Tuesday to capture the InterLakes high school league basketball title. Actually, Farmington beat Farmington.

The Falcons had seven point leads twice in the late second and early third periods, and for a solid eight minutes prevented the home court Huskies from dunking a single field goal.

IT TURNED into a see-saw match in the third period—and then the Falcon attack disintegrated.

The Huskies moved into the lead with 2 1/2 minutes to go, began eating up the clock, and got a bit of help from Luck when three Farmington shots at the basket missed in the final seconds.

Coach Jack Quigley's Falcons had a 6-1 league record going into the final match with Northern, which had been in second place much of the season with one loss.

Head the Farmington squad held up, it could have had its second league title in two years. It finished in second place.

THE FALCON implosion wasn't due to any lack of skill—just one of those bad days or lapses. They shot better than Northern, connecting on 19 of 54 field goal attempts to the Huskies' 19 of 63.

Northern won at the foul line, scoring 10 of 19 free throws (53 per cent) to Farmington's seven of 17 (41 per cent).

Guard Greg Dorow led Farmington scorers with 17 points on seven baskets and three free throws. Tom Wirtz added 16 points, George Grimaldi and Mike Ames eight apiece.

Northern had no star in the Dorow sense. But it did have 15 players who got 10 apiece.

They picked up 12 points, 10 of them on five field goals out of six shots in the last quarter, and Northern had three other players who got 10 apiece.

PUBLIC NOTICE

To comply fully with the new Michigan Constitution and with Public Act 409, subsequently adopted by the Michigan Legislature, the City of Farmington has reassessed all properties within the City of Farmington.

Public Act 409 states that all property in Michigan shall be assessed at fifty (50%) per cent of true cash value. The City of Farmington had been assessing at forty five (45%) per cent therefore, it was necessary to increase the assessments to the State Equalized Assessed Valuation of 50% of true cash value.

Since the County and the School Taxes are based on State Equalized Assessed Valuation, this reassessment will have no bearing on their tax levy. The City of Farmington may adjust their tax rate based on the new equalized assessed valuation so that there is no change in the total taxes levied.

The City of Farmington Assessment Rolls will be open for inspection from March 7 to March 15, 1967. The Board of Review will be in session March 7, 13, 14, 15 & 1967 at City Hall, 23600 Liberty St.
