Baseball Registration Dates Set

Local Cage Squads Shine In Tourney

Farmington is assured of a District 50 high school basketball tournament title.

Farmington High and North Farmington were set to take on each other Friday night after whipping rivals in the early part of last week. All games were on the FHS court.

The local squads both had easy times disposing of Class A rivals, winning all matches by anywhere from 10 to 21 points. The Falcons' Farmington outscored the Plymouth Rocks in all four quarters—even when Coach Jack Quiggle emptied the bench—as they won their second tournament game Wednesday, 75-54.

It was Tom Wirtz's game. The slender Farmington guard seemed unable to miss the basket as he fired in six field goals and two free throws for the team's high of 14 points.

The Falcons had had luck in the first four minutes as shots popped out of the basket. In the closing portion of the first quarter, Wirtz began to find the mark—from the corner, under the basket, on a break-away. The Falcons overcame the early 7-2 deficit and led 15-12 at the quarter.

Plymouth faded. In the second quarter, the Falcons' Greg Torow, who had opened his team's early scoring, found the mark with a pair of shots as he built up a 13-point total.

Big Mike Ames added another 13, connecting on five baskets and three free throws.

After the half, Doug Hamilton got into the contest. He tipped a field goal in on a rebound, broke away another time and dropped in a shot from the sidelines as he got six of his 10 points in the third quarter.

Top scorer of the game, however, was the Rocks' Mike Kubik. He gathered 15 points on five buckets and five free throws.

NORTH FARMINGTON breezed by an uncoordinated Walled Lake squad in Wednesday's opener, 76-63.

Coach Richard Wilbur and gold Raiders built up a 21-point lead early in the fourth quarter. Wilbur sent the youngsters in, and they made the Vikings work hard to narrow the margin.

Dick Copp had a noticeably good time with baskets in the third period, when the Raiders built up much of their margin over Walled Lake. Teammate Joel Comstock took advantage of four straight opportunities at the free throw line in that quarter.

At the out-cast Vikings fell further and further behind. The Walled Lake cheering section dwindled to six persons, by actual count, in the early part of the fourth quarter. By the closing minute, the Walled Lake cheerleaders were yelling to themselves.

Motion by Councilman Yoder supported by Councilman Allen to adopt the following RESOLUTION:

WHEREAS, The many local governments, including cities and villages, counties, school districts and townships in Southeast Michigan, form one regional community, with a diversity brought together physically, socially, and economically, and serviced by not just one unit of local government but by the many;

AND WHEREAS, The many separate, yet interrelated, local governments create significant political and organizational questions relative to effective and efficient coordination of needed services;

AND WHEREAS, The expansion of the concept of voluntary cooperation among local governments, while retaining local home rule, is the best solution for dealing with the regional challenges beyond individual capabilities;

AND WHEREAS, The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments proposed by the Committee of One Hundred provides the City of Farmington an opportunity to participate voluntarily with other local governments in Southeast Michigan to resolve problems, and develop policies and plans that are common and regional in nature;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the City of Farmington does hereby declare its intent to become a member of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, as generally proposed and approved by the Committee of One Hundred on June 30, 1966;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That participation shall be voluntary, with the right of withdrawal, and that said membership shall not be construed as in any manner impairing the right of local self government.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City of Farmington shall forthwith designate as official representative, as provided in the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments proposal, said representative shall serve as a charter member in the drafting of the organizational structure, and budget for the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City of Farmington recognizes its responsibility to share the financial support of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, and that the City will attempt to have Drake Road from Grand River to the Farmington City limits and Gill Road from Grand River to Freedom Drive, and the City will be Collector Streets for this section when it is developed.
