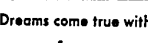

Miss Kayann L. Smith, 39, of 22420 Lila, died March 7 in Hurley Hospital. Flail of injuries suffered earlier in the morning following an automobile accident.

Miss Smith was a passenger in a car driven by Arthur J. Nelson Jr., 32, of Detroit. State police said Nelson's car apparently skidded on an icy patch of I-75, crossed the median and collided head-on with a car driven by Arlington Lutz Jr., Birch Run, who was also killed.

Miss Smith was born Sept. 21, 1947 in Ann Arbor, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Smith. She attended school in Farmington and graduated in the high school class of 1965.

Funeral services took place Thursday in the chapel of Thayer Funeral Home with Dr. W. Leslie Williams of Farmington First Methodist Church officiating.

Miss Smith's body was taken to N. Lewisburg, Ohio on Friday morning and another service took place in Freshwater Funeral Home in N. Lewisburg on Saturday afternoon with burial in Middleburg Cemetery.

PAUL D. COCHRANE

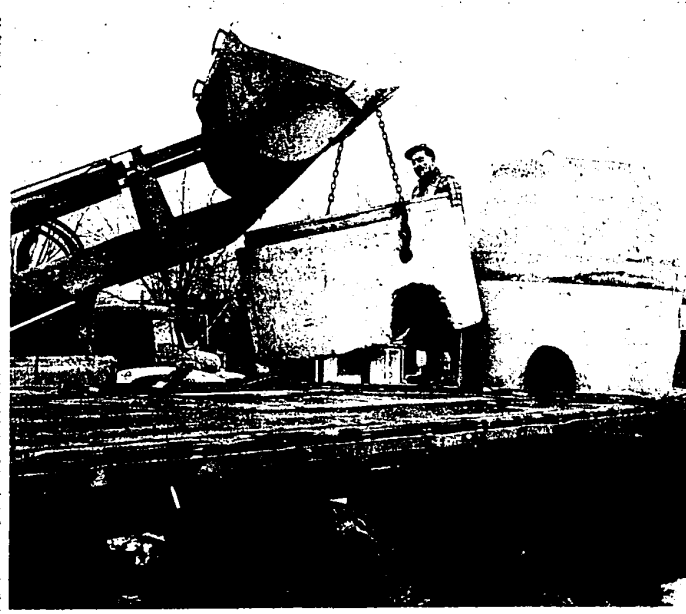

FFC KENNETH EDWARDS

Services for PFC Kenneth M. Edwards, 19, of Royal Oak, were held Thursday in Northside Missionary Baptist Church, Madison Heights, with Pastor James O. Baseman officiating. Burial was in Castlewood, Va. Heene-Sundquist Funeral Home of Farmington was in charge of arrangements.

Edwards was killed in South Vietnam less than a month after arriving for duty. He entered the Army last August. Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Edwards, and a sister, Pamela Sue, of Royal Oak and a brother, Jimmy R. Edwards of Farmington Township.



Museum Built On Historic Fort

Fort Wayne Military Museum, 66033 W. Jefferson Ave., is the only historic monument in the Detroit area featuring Detroit's military history of two and one-half centuries interrupted through Indian and military exhibits. Old Fort Wayne was built in the 1840's, one of the historic landmarks in Detroit, complete with a dry moat, casemates, tunnels, powder magazines, earthworks and stone barracks.

Among the continuing exhibits are: MEDAL OF HONOR, an exhibit honoring men of the Civil War who won the medal of honor and featuring a list of Michigan men who have been awarded this medal. Detroit's own heroes have been honored with a map of the City of Detroit showing the parks which have been named for them.

MICHIGAN GUNS - a special exhibit of Michigan made rifles, muskets and shotguns. Included are over-and-unders, muzzle-loaders (slappers), breechloaders, percussion and flintlock weapons. Featured are works of gunsmiths from the southern half of the Lower Peninsula—several from Detroit.

CIVIL WAR BARRACKS ROOM - the restoration of a Civil War enlisted man's barracks room depicts the soldier's life in the garrison. Bunks, uniforms and other furnishings present a life-like representation of 100 years ago.

It must be remembered, of course, that Dr. Lwoff's findings apply only to certain virus infections. FEVERS can, however, be due to other causes as well.

Old Wives Tales Might Be True

Those old wives might have known what they were talking about after all. So says Nobel Prize microbiologist, Dr. Andre Lwoff, observing that patients who sweat out their virus infections are likely to knock it out more quickly than if they take fever-reducing drugs.

Experiments performed by the French Nobelist show that "small-increases in temperature can markedly decrease the multiplication of a virus."

He infected 66 animals with the same virus. Half the animals were given medication that reduced their temperature. Half were given no medication and their fever was allowed to run its course.

All the animals whose fever was reduced, died. Only six of the non-treated ones did. Dr. Lwoff has also demonstrated that polio virus grows well at 95 degrees Fahrenheit, but increasingly poorly as the temperature approaches 104 degrees.

Conservation Dept. Called 'Out Of Step'

Michigan's Conservation Department is badly out of step with the times. Even its own news releases admit to this by saying that hunters spent \$725,000 less for licenses than they did the year before.

Years ago, hunters were content to buy a hunting license for the mere pleasure of getting outdoors and enjoying the fresh air and scenery. They had a pretty good chance to kill a deer or knock off a limit of ducks or pheasants when they went afield but few of them gave that much thought. Getting outdoors and relaxing was the big thing.

NOWADAYS we live in a different society where everything comes with a guarantee. When half-a-million hunters buy deer licenses each of them expects to get a buck, even though Michigan doesn't have that many bucks. To the American who now has almost everything in life guaranteed for him by the government, this comes as a rude shock.

Quite obviously, hunting license sales are going to continue to decline unless the Conservation Department soon comes up with a new gimmick. Luckily, there are a number of things they can try.

How about giving green stamps with each license purchased? The hunter who bought a regular deer license, small game license and an assortment of bow and arrow deer, duck and trapping licenses could easily blow \$20. Think of the bundle of stamps he could get! And, if double stamps were offered on

Wednesdays, every wife in Michigan would be forcing her husband to buy hunting licenses. The men might fight it but in the end they would give in to their wives.

OR, MAYBE the Department would find it more fun to rig up a lively bingo game, based on the license serial numbers. Winning numbers could be announced over all radio and television stations at noon on opening day of the hunting season.

Another idea would be to have lucky grouse hunters submit a tail feather from a bird they might happen to kill, for a "Match The Tail" feathers' contest. We could see hunters from all over Michigan and surrounding states excitedly trying to shoot a grouse to see if their feather might match the one in Lansing.

Winners of these contests might be presented with the use of a state car for an entire year, if they were willing to share it with a State Senator. Or, possibly, the winner might rather have a coveted position on a citizen's committee to manage the deer herd.

POSSIBILITIES for prizes such as these are limited only by the imagination.

Certainly something like this must be done soon if hunting license sales are to be brought up. It is quite obvious that a lot of hunters no longer believe that hunting is meant for having fun.
