## Understanding your HEALTH

Recently you may have read stories concerning outbreaks of scarlet fever and strep throat. Well, both of these diseases can be very serious, and I think you should know something about their symptoms so a doctor can be immediately called in to treat your child should he appear to be coming down with either illness.

Warning signs of strep infection are sore throat and a fever. If your child has these you should call your doctor at once.

Scarlet fever symptoms are the same in the beginning, but a rash may appear two or three days after the first indications. The scarlet fever rash is first seen on the neck and chest, but later it may spread to the rest of the body.

With the diagnosis of scarlet fever your doctor will recommend prompt action. He will advise you to put your child to bed at once in a room by himself, and keep other members of the family away.

Above all, you should keep the child in bed and not let him give permission for him to get up—this is the best way to protect his heart and kidneys.

TO PROTECT others in your family, you must take strict precautions to make sure that they do not come in contact with the patient or with articles that he has used. This includes objects that he may have handled when he was coming down with the disease.

Remember, only the doctor and the person caring for the child should enter the sickroom—scarlet fever is highly communicable and can spread quickly through your entire family.

The most important thing to do then, is to call your doctor when you suspect symptoms that indicate the possibility of strep throat or scarlet fever.

Prompt medical treatment can quickly render the disease inapparent and reduce the possibility of any serious complications.

Chaplin Classic At Ford Museum

Charlie Chaplin's 1925 film classic "The Gold Rush" will be the featured film in the Henry Ford Museum's weekly famous early movie series Sunday, March 19, at 2 p.m. and 4 p.m.

The Canadian Film Archives recently conducted a 40 nation poll of critics which named "The Gold Rush" the greatest all-time movie comedy.

A selection of great films from the early days of the motion picture industry, both silent and sound, including comedies, westerns, adventure and children's favorites, is shown each Sunday afternoon in the Henry Ford Museum theater. The early movie series continues through April 16. Famous early movie programs are scheduled at regular admission charge to the Museum.

## Three Flags DAR To View Slides Of Museum Gallery

Three Flags Chapter DAR will meet March 13 for a noon luncheon in the home of Mrs. Howard Byrne, Jr., 1103 Irving, Royal Oak. Mrs. Byrne will be assisted by Mrs. Lyle Brown, of Lathrup Village, and Mrs. Harmon Tanner, of Pleasant Ridge.

Following the luncheon will be the regular business meeting, with the regent, Mrs. Charles Shaw, presiding. The program will be slides of the Museum Gallery, owned by the National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution.

THE NATIONAL Society owns an entire city block, bounded by 17th, 18th, C and D Streets, Northwest, in one of the most beautiful sections of Washington, D.C. Three buildings for distinctly different purposes now occupy this block. This is the largest group of buildings in the world built and financed entirely by a woman's organization. Most appropriately they bear the numbers 1775 C and 1776 D Street, Northwest.

The Museum Gallery is located at 1776 D Street, N.W., in the Administration Building and is open to the public, free of charge, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, except during Continental Congress, in April.

The Museum has over 15,000 manuscripts, a few include over 100 objects. Collections include jewelry, china, glass, silver, pewter, wooden and ivory ware, men's, women's and children's clothing and accessories, toys, paintings, furniture, military equipment used during the Revolutionary War, and a 13 star flag which went through some battles of the Revolution. Many of these articles belonged to the Founding Fathers and their families.
