

Reading Panel Discussion

A classroom open house and a panel discussion on the problems in the teaching and learning of reading will highlight the Monday, March 20, meeting of the Beechview PTA.

The third in a series of open houses will begin at 7:30 p.m. preceding the business meeting. On hand to meet parents and discuss classroom activities will be teachers of the kindergarten, first grade and type B special education classes.

This meeting will conclude the successive open houses which were pioneered and favorably received this year.

Election of officers for 1967-1968 will enliven the business meeting at 8 p.m. Nominations from the floor will be accepted in addition to the recommendations of the nomination committee.

THE FIFTH program in the series topical problems in elementary education will be the panel discussion on reading led by Dr. Harry Hahn, Miss Catherine Van Hov, and Dr. Sanford Bloomberg.

Dr. Hahn, director of instruction, Oakland Schools, Pontiac, will discuss the theoretical aspects of the teaching of reading, and Miss Van Hov will discuss the handling of reading problems at Beechview.

Dr. Bloomberg, program chairman and school psychiatrist of the Birmingham School System, will outline the psychiatric approach to children with reading problems.
