

McDonald Backs U.S Tax Cuts

Congressman Jack McDonald, R-19th District, announced today his support for restoration of the seven per cent investment tax credit.

But he labeled the move "too little too late" and called on Congress to consider an "across-the-board" corporate income tax cut and a cut in "excise taxes as a way of strengthening consumer spending."

In a speech delivered to the House, McDonald criticized President Johnson's request as "inconsistent and incredible" in view of the administration's unwillingness to abandon its demand for a six per cent surcharge on corporate and private incomes.

He further suggested that the Congress take steps to bring the budget into line with projected revenues to avoid a deficit now expected to climb from \$3 billion to \$12 billion.

In announcing his support for the investment credit, McDonald noted that "the sluggish economy that we are now experiencing can be traced, in part, to the decision to clamp the lid on the investment credit. And as a representative of a district acutely sensitive to slumping auto sales, swollen inventories, and projected layoffs, I favor any measure which will spur the economy."
