

## NBD Offers Check-Loan Credit Plan

National Bank of Detroit has introduced a new service of offering a personal line of revolving credit through the medium of a checking account coupled with a check guarantee card.

It is called the "Check-Mate" plan. Consisting of a checking account "mated" with certain other services, the plan provides for automatic loans in multiples of \$100 to checking account customers who meet credit standards.

The first step in using the new service is for the customer to apply for a line of credit, which may range from \$500 to \$2,400.

The customer then has a choice of two ways in which loans can be automatically deposited in his checking account—when his checking account balance reaches an overdraft condition, or when the balance falls below \$200 (the minimum balance which is required to keep his checking account free of service charges).

The customer also receives a check guarantee card enabling him to cash his personal check up to \$100.

## Hated Jacket Two Churches Combine A Life Saver For Joint Observance

Marine 2nd Lt. Gerald L. (Jerry) Flick, speaking from his hospital bed in Portsmouth, Va., credits his life being saved to a "flak jacket" he hated to wear.

The 1957 Farmington High School graduate was wrestling in a ditch in Vietnam with a Viet Cong when the VC opened fire and killed the enemy soldier.

Says Flick, "I could feel the rounds hitting him on top of me. I think his body saved my life. They killed their own man."

The 29-year-old Marine officer, recuperating in the Naval Hospital at Portsmouth, was wounded by one bullet in his hip Jan. 24 near Phu Bai, close to the Demilitarized Zone in the northern tip of Vietnam.

Flick's company executive officer told him he had been recommended for the Silver Star for tackling the Viet soldier.

"We were on a company search and destroy mission" he relates. "I had sent 15 men from my platoon across a river. When I followed, the VC ambushed us. I got across and started running forward. One of my men was down and a VC was standing over him."

Flick tackled the enemy soldier and the two rolled into a ditch. Inside were about eight other VC soldiers. They opened fire on both men. Other Marines ran up in time to kill the VC soldiers before they could kill Flick.

Flick said he felt one bullet bounce off his flak jacket—his protective chest armor vest. The bullet that entered his hip paralyzed him.

Flick is a nine year Marine veteran. He rose to a sergeant's grade, then earned his officer's bars in 1965.

He is a native of Farmington. Flick's father, George Flick, of 32650 Pembroke, Livonia, has visited him in Portsmouth, as have a brother, George Jr., and a sister, Mrs. Mable Cox. Another sister, Mrs. Mary Spitzer, of Allen Park, is staying with Flick's wife at his Portsmouth home.

He has also been visited by Lt. Gen. Alpha L. Bowers, commanding general of the Atlantic Fleet Marine Force.

His wife, Barbara, comes to visit him nightly and his five year old twin daughters see him every three or four days.

Flick had been in Vietnam five months when he was wounded.

"I used to hate that flak jacket. I took off that son-of-a-gun every time we got back to rest camp. I'll sleep in it now if I have to go back to Vietnam," he said.

According to the military doctors, his medical prognosis is "good."

Mr. Pepper, a 1957 graduate of Farmington High School, is a graduate of Michigan State University and is completing his master's degree at Eastern Michigan University. Presently he is teaching in the Detroit public schools.

The couple will be married June 24.

It represents one of the few major Church unions successfully completed since the time of the Protestant Reformation.
