The Farmington Jaycee Auxiliary is joining in a county-wide campaign named "Operation First Step." The purpose of the campaign, sponsored by the Oakland County Chapter of the Association for Emotional Disturbed Children, is to inform the general public of a vital mental health service called the "Intake and Referral Service."

Oakland County's Community Mental Health Services Board initiated the service because many families must face serious mental health problems and do not know where to turn for help. The service makes it possible for any resident to speak to a trained psychiatric social worker who will evaluate the problem and then refer the person to the appropriate agency for help.

The service is available for emergency situations as well as in assisting long range planning. The "Intake and Referral Service" is available to all children and adults with either a disturbance or a retardation problem.
