Kitchen Most Likely Spot For Poisoning

Your child is most likely to be poisoned in the kitchen and least likely to be poisoned in the garage, statistics show.

Dr. George H. Lowery, director of the University of Michigan Hospital's poison control center, says almost all poisonings occur in the home.

In observance of National Poison Prevention Week, March 19-25, Dr. Lowery urges both physician and parent to "hide the pills." Half of the one million nonfatal poisonings and 1,500 deaths each year could be prevented by putting away medications properly, he said.

"IT IS AN interesting comment on our way of life that tranquilizers have overtaken barbiturates as the second most common cause of poisoning. 'Aspirin is still the No. 1 killer and aspirin can be found in nearly every home. Birth control pills may soon top the list.'"

Physicians can help reduce the amount of drugs in the home by prescribing only what is needed for an immediate illness. Then few pills would be left over on the bedside table or in the bathroom cabinet.

Two-thirds of the poisons swallowed by youngsters are not in their usual storage places when discovered by children.

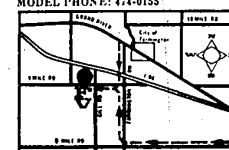
