

African Violet Show To Be Held April 29

African violets by the hundreds will be on display from 1:30 to 8 p.m. in the Masonic Temple, Farmington Road at Grand River, on April 29 when the Michigan State African Violet Society presents its eighth annual show. The event is hosted by the Tri-County African Violet Club.

In keeping with the founding of Farmington by the Quakers, the theme of the show is "Violets Invade Quakertown."

Registration of plants will be made from 8 to 10 a.m. on the 29th. A business meeting and election of officers of the Michigan society will be held at 10 a.m. in the parlor of the Salem Church of Christ on Oakland Avenue. Luncheon, by reservation, will be served at noon by the ladies guild of the church, with Mrs. Joseph Ziska, of the Hill and Dale Garden Club, as guest speaker.

Exhibitors may be either amateur or advanced. Advanced exhibitors are those who have previously won best of show or sweepstakes. Amateurs are those who have won ribbons but never best of show or sweepstakes. Novices may also enter.

Classes of plants that may be entered include three types of specimen plants—single blossoms, double blossoms and those with any type or size of blossoms with any foliage.

Additional classes include plants grown in natural light and one for children up to 14 years of age.

There is an artistic class for which growing violet plants must be featured with other plant materials and accessories permitted and also a division for artistic and educational displays.

Exhibitors will be competing for at least 12 awards.

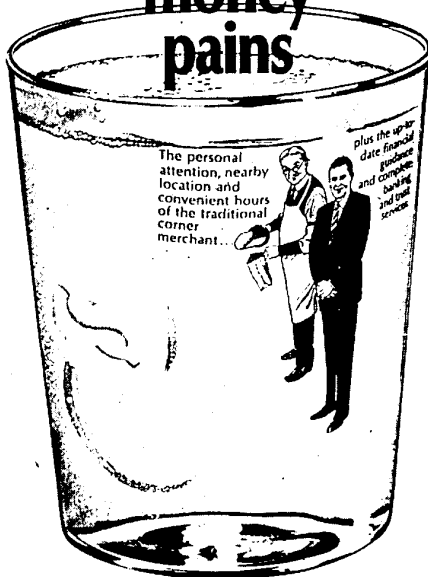
