Gadget printing is a good way for the children to make gift wrap.

What you need to gather are brown and white paper, jars of poster paint available at the creative racks of variety stores, and household gadgets galore. For the most part, the paint will wash off easily if the gadget, surface is firm. When porous surfaced printing gadgets are used, for instance, it's better to supply old or throwaway items.

These are just a few of the things a child can print designs with: a fork, a cork, a spatula, hair rollers, bottle caps, washcloths, a tin cup, a carrot, a cookie cutter inlaid with clay, or the top of an herb jar. Poster paint is poured into a foil pan. The child dips the object into it, then makes the impression on paper. Trying out designs takes less than a minute. The paper can be used for birthday or holiday wrap for small gifts. While the pursuit looks aimless, it has double purpose for a small artist.

"Unquenchable curiosity is part of a youngster," point out playmate planners at Whitman Publishing Company of Racine, Wisconsin, leading producers of juvenile art and activity items. "So the more objects a child can work with the more pleased he is. Small utensils and low-cost art materials give him hours of experiments. New juvenile books at local stores on print and paper art and painting supply ideas.

Some printing can be used to make invitations and greeting cards. Lettering can be done freehand in crayon or traced from a stencil book.

A child who prints with the top of a bayonet jar could win awards later.

His hobby gives him art background for future museum trips, club activities, school courses and contests.

## Sen. Hart Opposes Kuhn's Stand On National Con-Con

U.S. Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., takes a dim view of a proposed national constitutional convention that would be aimed at reversing the U.S. Supreme Court's "one man, one vote" legislative apportionment decisions.

Hart's view was in direct opposition to that of State Sen. George Kuhn, R-West Bloomfield, who favors the national con-con.

Hart, Michigan's senior senator in Washington, was in Oakland County last weekend to attend a Democratic Party dinner which also drew some of the party faithful from Farmington.

"WHEN THE Founding Fathers wrote that document," he permitted a constitutional convention of two-thirds of the states petitioned for it," Hart said in an interview.

"Well, we've got 50 states and 32 of them have passed resolutions asking Congress to call a convention, which means we've only got two to go."

"The arithmetic makes it uncomfortable," he said. "The national con-con movement is the effort of Republicans to get Congress to start a con-

stitutional amendment allowing states to apportion on some basis other than population."

HART ATTACKED the incoming legislative petitioning. "The language is not identical, in some cases."

"But the real danger—aside from the fact that such a convention might upset the 'one man, one vote' proposition—is that state and local governments would no longer be responsive."

"But even more important is that such a convention would not be limited in subject matter. Then we could get into the argument of whether we could afford the Bill of Rights or not... let's change that a little... maybe we ought to have prayers in public schools... maybe, unless you've got five per cent of the population going to your church, we'd better not have your church."

He predicted — fingers crossed — that the Michigan Legislature wouldn't join the national con-con movement.
