For one North Farmington senior, a Cinderella year is in the offing. Better than that, things she never even dreamed are about to come true.

Patricia Norton's devotion to her violin studies has brought her a singular honor. She will tour Europe this summer with the All-Student Orchestra and Band of the USA playing 14 concerts in 10 countries.

Daughter of the Aylward S. Nortons of 28833 Beacontree, Patricia has been studying violin seriously for the past two years. She began her musical work at the age of nine, but dropped it for an interval to resume during high school years.

She has been twice to the music camp at Interlochen and, according to her mother, has received much encouragement and inspiration from Mrs. Marjorie Mowatt, instrumental teacher for Farmington schools. Patricia has been a member of the Michigan All-Youth Symphony, also.

It was last September that she was invited to audition for the European tour by submitting a tape to the competition. Only one and a half students per state are selected, and so far as the Nortons are aware, Patricia is the only Michigan member of the group.

Leaving here on June 19, the band's itinerary will include Germany, Austria, Italy, France, Innsbruck, Holland, Luxembourg, Liechtenstein and England. Following the tour, Patricia will travel to Cologne to be met by the family of her German pen pal with whom she will live for a year.

In Germany, there is a fifth year of high school which Patricia will attend in a small town near Coblenz with her good friend, Barbel Rosenbaum. The girls have been corresponding very regularly for three years.

Plans for this visit have been most thorough. The German school sent over tests to discover how far their guest had progressed with the language, and she will attend besides her regular school one where she can increase her language comprehension.

Her music is not to be neglected, either. For this, she will enroll in the Coblenz Conservatory. Such a program has all the ingredients for a lively and exciting year abroad.

At the end of the visit, Barbel's father writes, "I will return with our two daughters." The young fraulein will then spend her first university year here in Farmington with the Nortons. They have been busily searching for a college to satisfy the requirements of both young ladies. Patricia's major will be music, and Barbel will study languages. She needs to be fluent in six for her chosen profession of interpreter.

The entire Norton family is a-buzz with anticipation over Patricia's highly exciting future. Her friends in the community, too, wish her bon voyage as she undertakes her adventure.

Stepladder Accident Season Here

Approaching soon will be the peak of the ladder accident season, predicts the Institute for Safer Living.

Here are some simple rules, which may help prevent a mishap, prepared by the Institute for Safer Living of the American Mutual Liability Insurance Company:

1. Whether the ladder is yours, borrowed, or rented, before each use give it a safety check to make sure it is in good condition.
2. When leaning a ladder against a wall, make sure its feet rest away from the wall at a distance approximately one-quarter the working length of the ladder.
3. Place the ladder so the feet rest firmly on a level surface.
4. Never climb a ladder when the rungs or shoes are slippery.
5. Always face the ladder, grasping with both hands when climbing or descending.
6. If you are using a stepladder, open fully so that the braces latch.

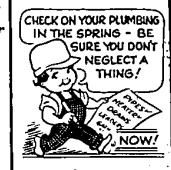

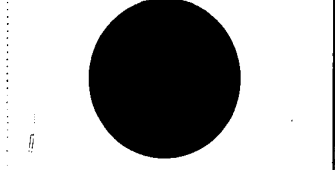

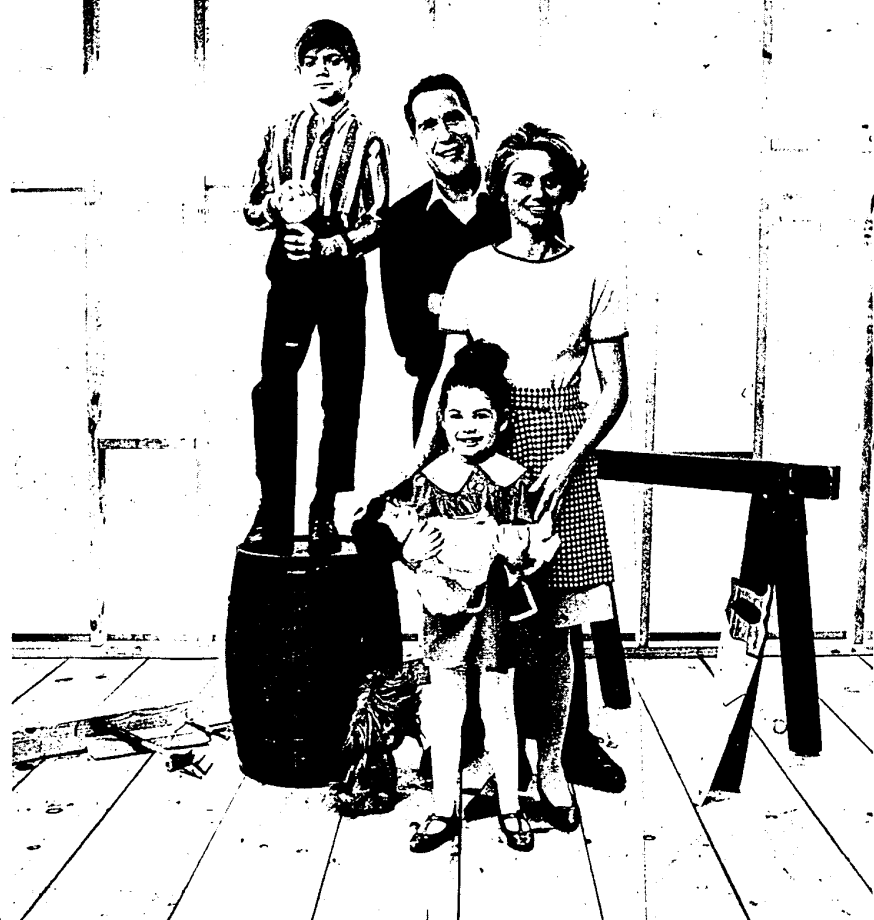
